Seek Sanitary Control Water Supply Area

The Village Council held the regular meeting on Monday evening at which all the members were present and the Reeve presided.

The Clerk was instructed to make application to the Provincial Board of Health for a certificate of sanitary control over the area of the water supply as mapped out by the Engineer.

A by-law, fixing the tax rate at 45 mills, was passed, the rate being made up as follows: County rate 9 mills; Public School 11 mills; High School 6 mills; general rate 19 mills. It was decided to purchase a coat for the policeman.

The Clerk was instructed to publish a notice that from May 1st to Sept. 30th dogs must not run at large.

A grant of \$15.00 was made to the Horticultural Society to assist in beautifying the village.

Mr. H. R. Metcalf was given a renewal of his lease at the pumping station on the same terms as heretofore.

The Secretary of the Waterworks System was instructed to adjust the water rates in the Reburn building to the proper tenants.

Grey Presbytery Met in Hanover on Tuesday

The third regular meeting of the Grey Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held in Trinity Church in Hanover on Tuesday, April 28th, with about 75 delegates present.

Rev. H. S. Warren, pastor of Annesley Church, Markdale, presided.

The morning session opened at ten o'clock with Devotional period. Mrs. Rutherford of Owen Sound, president of Grey Presbytery, was welcomed and presented her report from the W. M. S. She reported a decrease in membership and givings, but an increased interest in missionary literature and the women of foreign lands.

The treasurer, Mr. W. L. Young of Markdale, showed the finances to be in a healthy condition.

During the noon hour the devotional address was given by Rev. Walter Cannon of Kemble, his subject being "How can the Christian Church Cope with World Needs?"

Rev. Dr. Hazen of Toronto, representing the Ontario Temperance Federation, was given the privilege of corresponding member.

During the afternoon session two important resolutions were approved: "That we, the Presbytery of Grey County, protest the concessions granted to the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of this province, and vigorously ask for repeal of the amendments passed at the last session of the Legislature."

And "That this Presbytery desires to approve the action of the Owen Sound mayor in his condemnation of bootlegging of liquor and associated evils."

The remainder of the afternoon was confined to the presentation and discussion of reports.

The evening session was a continuation of reports of various committees. The report of the Historical Committee stressed the importance of preserving all old records and documents pertaining to the early days of the Church. Rev. R. G. Halbert of Durham in his address recommended the training of leaders and helpers in the community to assist the pastor when ill or overworked. An invitation was extended from the Thornbury delegation to hold the fall meeting in their United Church.

On behalf of the visiting delegation, words of appreciation were expressed to the pastor and the official board for the use of the Church and to the ladies for the excellent meals served and courtesy shown by all.

Maxwell People Injured in Auto Accident

A serious car accident occurred on the highway, just south of Holland Centre, on Sunday night when a light sedan, owned and driven by Mr. Norman Cairns of Maxwell, crashed into the iron and concrete bridge, following a blown tire. Mr. Cairns received a fractured knee cap, cuts and bruises on the face and body. His wife received a severe gash across the chin and she had several teeth knocked out and also suffered from bruises and cuts about the body. Mrs. Devine sr. of Port Elgin was believed to have received a fractured hip and other cuts and bruises. Nelson Cairns, little son of the driver, received facial and body injuries, while another son escaped uninjured.

The injured received first aid at the home of Mr. Jos. McMullen and were then brought to Markdale hospital for attention.

Mr. Cairns was on his way home to Maxwell and when approaching the bridge the right front tire blew out. He was travelling at a moderate rate of speed but the driver lost control over the car and it crashed into the side of the bridge. The force of the impact shot Mrs. Cairns and son, Nelson, out onto the roadway, while the others remained in the car.

Mr. Cairns sold his garage at Maxwell a month ago to Melvin and Geo. Sled of Flesherton, but was still residing in that village.

James L. Rowe Died at Clarkson

After a lingering illness of over four years there passed away at his home in Clarkson on April 23rd, James Leroy Rowe, beloved husband of Frances Margaret Coleman, in his 77th year. Death was due to a stroke. The funeral service was held on Saturday from his late residence to Clarkson cemetery. Rev. R. A. Spencer, pastor of the United Church in Clarkson, had charge of the service. Prior to the uniting of Churches Mr. Rowe was a Presbyterian.

The late Mr. Rowe was born in Clarkson in 1859, but when a young man moved with his parents to Berkeley, residing there until about 16 years ago when he moved to Markdale. In 1922 he returned to Clarkson.

Deceased is survived by his wife; three daughters, Mrs. George McFadden of Berkeley, Clara of Toronto, Mrs. O. T. Parkin of Clarkson; two sons, Roy of Lorne Park, Stanley of Clarkson; there are sixteen grandchildren; three sisters, Margaret of Clarkson, Mrs. John Boyd of Toronto and Mrs. R. Duff of Cooksville; two brothers, Byron of Clarkson and Thomas of Berkeley. Another daughter, Mrs. Robt. J. Mercer, predeceased him ten years ago.

The pallbearers were four nephews: Harry, James and Donald Duff and Elder Rowe, Peter McDonald and Arthur Rose.

Bank Manager Arrested for Theft of Bonds

Reginald J. Gillilan, 48, of 215 Clendenning Avenue, manager of the Royal York Hotel branch of the Bank of Montreal, was arrested in his office at noon yesterday by Detective-Sergeant James McIlraith, charged with theft of securities valued at \$35,458 from the bank.

Gillilan refused at police headquarters to make any statement concerning the charge. He asked for his lawyer, with whom he talked for considerable time. He was then transferred to Court Street Station. Bail of \$20,000 was set.

The prisoner, the police said, was in a highly nervous condition when arrested and on the verge of collapsing.

For a number of years he was employed with the bank, having been in a West Toronto branch before being transferred to the downtown branch.

The police said none of the reported missing securities had been found. A week's remand will be asked for by the Crown in the Police Court this morning. This will enable the police to investigate Gillilan's reported dealings on the stock market.

The above item appears in to-day's Toronto Globe and refers to a former member of the staff of the Merchants Bank here. Mr. Gillilan has a host of friends here who are hoping that the whole matter is a mistake.
