### Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were again heavy this week and the market was inclined to be slow on some classes of cattle, especially heavy steers. There was a fair demand for good butcher cattle, also cows and bulls. About 160 cattle were bought and shipped to the old land and quite a number of cattle were bought by American buyers, which was a considerable help to the trade.

Only a very few heavy steers made 6.00, the bulk of the good to choice cattle on offer selling from 5.25 to 5.75, with plain kind downward to 4.50. Choice butcher cattle and steers sold at from 4.50 to 4.75, with a few tops at 5.00; fair to good from 4.00 to 4.50; common and medium 3.50 to 4.00. Baby heaves were in limited demand and choice brought from 5.75 to 6.50; common and medium from 4.50 to 5.25. Grass cattle were in good demand with best light stockers from 4.00 to 4.50 and short-keep feeders from 4.75 to 5.00. Choice butcher cows brought from 3.50 to 3.75; light heifers cows up to 4.00; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 1.50 to 2.25. Best milch cows and springers ranged from \$40.00 to \$55.00; others very slow of sale. The bull trade was steady, choice light butcher bulls selling at from 3.75 to 4.00; heavy bulls from 3.50 to 3.75; common 3.25 to 3.50.

The lamb market opened slow on account of a heavy supply, and the choice feed lot lambs sold at 10.75. On Tuesday the market continued slow and prices declined a further quarter. The sheep trade was also considerably easier, choice sheep selling at 4.50 to 5.00. Calves held active and steady with choice from 8.00 to 8.50 and a few fancy calves up to 9.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.50; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50.

The hog market has held steady in spite of lower bids from buyers. Monday's and Tuesday's sales were made at from 8.35 to 8.50 for truck deliveries, depending upon length of haul. It is expected the market will hold steady the balance of the week.
