Grey-Dufferin Tennis League Re-Organized

The re-organization meeting of Grey-Dufferin Tennis League was held at Dundalk on Thursday night, May 14th, with members present from Markdale, Dundalk and Shelburne. Bert Hamilton of this place was elected President; B. C. McArthur of Shelburne Vice-Pres., and Leslie Russell of Dundalk was re-elected Secretary.

The meeting decided to charge new clubs entering the League \$4, and the year's fee of \$1.00 was set. The schedule will be drawn shortly with home and home games for the two teams with the highest points playing off for the trophy won last year by Orangeville.

An addition to the constitution was made, that all members must be registered with the League Secretary, and to participate in play-off games must have played in two previous schedule games.

An invitation will be issued to Flesherton to enter the League and make it a five team group: Dundalk, Shelburne, Orangeville, Flesherton and Markdale.

A much earlier start is expected in the schedule this year as the courts in all places have already been put in shape.

Editor of Hanover Post Died Wednesday

Mr. Geo. H. Mitchell, editor of the Hanover Post, died at his home in Hanover on Wednesday after an illness of but a few days. He had not been in robust health for some time but was able to attend to business until Thursday of last week. He was 55 years of age and had resided in Hanover for the past 54 years. When his father died in 1906 he took over the management of the paper and was successful in the business. In his younger days he was a member of Hanover's fast lacrosse team and took a keen interest in the welfare of the community. He was a member of the United Church and the Masonic order. The funeral takes place in Hanover on Saturday afternoon.

Charles Dowding Dead at Ladner, B. C.

Mr. Chas. Dowding, a former resident of Euphrasia township, died at his home in Ladner, B.C., on Friday, May 15th. Deceased had been in ill health for a year. He was born on the 7th Lane of Euphrasia on Aug. 14th, 1871, and when only a young man moved to B. C. In 1897 he returned to Ontario owing to the death of his mother, and remained here for 12 years when he again returned to B. C. He purchased 60 acres of land there and at the time of his death owned 162 acres. On this land was built the home in which he spent the remainder of his life.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his wife; one son, Wray, at home; three daughters, Mrs. S. Reynolds of Ladner; Mrs. A. Satermo of Alberta, and Miss Effie in Vancouver; three sisters, Mrs. Wesley Cornfield of Kimberley; Mrs. John Gibbard of Mission, B.C., and Mrs. Barker of Vancouver; three brothers, John A. in Kamloops; Edgar J. in Ontario, Calif., and George J. in Portland, Oregon.

Mr. Dowding was a life-long reader of The Standard and we extend our deepest sympathies to the bereaved family.

Thomas McFadden Died in Mono Township

Mono lost another of its old residents on Thursday, April 30th, in the death at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Oliver E. Scott, of Thomas McFadden, in his 86th year. Deceased had been in unusually good health for a man of his advanced years until Saturday preceding his demise, when he was taken ill with pneumonia, a malady frequently spoken of as the friend of aged people. There was no suffering and he slept peacefully away as befitted the close of a useful and well-spent life.

Thomas McFadden was born in Manvers township, Durham County, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert McFadden. When a child he moved to Markdale, Grey County, with his parents. He came to Mono in 1884, settling on lot 22, con. 5, east, where he farmed until the death of his wife eight years ago, when he gave up the farm to spend the evening of life with his daughter, Mrs. Scott, lot 82, 1st line, east, Mono. Deceased was a member of Primrose United Church, one of the oldest members of Relessey L.O.L. No. 1083 and a staunch Conservative. He took a keen interest in the work of the Orange Order and had been through the offices of his home lodge, filling the chair of Master with great acceptance. A quiet good-natured man, who dearly loved a joke, he was popular with his neighbors and friends, who always found him a man of his word and fair and honorable in his dealings. Mr. McFadden was married in 1898 to Mary Hand of Stanton, who, as already stated, predeceased her husband eight years ago. His loss is mourned by his daughter, Mrs. Scott, two grandchildren, Edmund and Doris Jean Scott, and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Carson of Allerton and Mrs. Elizabeth McFadden of Toronto.

The funeral, which was under the auspices of the Orange Order, was held from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Scott on Saturday afternoon and was attended by many present and former neighbors and also by a number of relatives and friends from a distance. Services at the house and grave were taken by his pastor, Rev. H. O. Hutcheson of Shelburne. The committal service of the Orange Order was read by W. Bros. Robt. W. Holmes and R. J. McCutcheon, W.M. and Chaplain of L.O.L. 1083. The remains were carried to their last resting place in the family plot in the Forest Lawn cemetery by six nephews, Messrs. Robert, George, R. W. E., J. J., W. E. and Elgin McFadden. Flower-bearers, all members of the Orange Order, were Bros. John Fines, Levi Smith, Leonard Buchanan and Sam. White.
