Highway to be Finished to Berkeley

Winners at Grey County Stable Burned Early on Mrs. Jas. Crowther Died No Blame Attached in Sweeney's Death

"We, the jury empanelled to inquire into the death of Edward Sweeney, find from the evidence that he received injuries resulting ilton on Highway No. 6, two miles south of Dornoch, on night of May was united in marriage to James 1st at approximately 10 o'clock. From the conflicting evidence given, it is impossible for us to place any blame."

Such was the verdict of the jury summoned by Coroner, Dr. D. B. Jamieson at the inquest held in Durham town hall Wednesday regarding the fatal truck collision north of Durham on May 1st. Crown Attorney Birnie was prosecutor and with the exception of the late Edward Sweeney, who died from injuries suffered, all participants of the accident and a number of witnesses gave evidence.

The jury comprised H. W. Wilson, oreman, J. B. Duffield, Clarence McGirr, Donald McQueen, Geo. Mc-Meekin, Jas. P. Smith, M. McCallum, J. D. McAuliffe, John McKechnie.

Geo. Rosenblood and Tudor Davis occupants of the laden Hamilton truck stated they were travelling south well to their side of highway about foot from edge of pavement. John Birr, driver of the wrecked Birr & Sweeney truck, said he held to his own side of road, watching ditch. The other truck lights glared. He had a glass of beer in Walkerton that afternoon but no liquor since. They were taking home on seat two cartons of ale and porter Sweeney had bought. The Crown Attorney charged some bottles were intact, others had caps off and contents removed, but witness claimed they opened none. He was going about 35 miles per hour, other truck about 30 he thought.

Richard Screrus, a truck driver head of Rosenblood, said Birr's ruck, the only one to pass him. crowded him against fence at Rocky.

Others to give evidence were Bert Marsales. Robt. Mortley and Wm. Holley, living near scene of accident Prov. Officers Storey and Noble and Constable Scott. Officer Storey testified as to condition of the wrecked rucks, how they were situated when he arrived on scene and what liquor was found and where. In his opinion, accident was caused by both trucks crowding too near the centre of pavement. It was a fine clear night, said Officer Noble, who substantiated Storey's evidence. Coroner Jamieson asked jury to find when, where and by what means Edward Sweeney came to his death. -Durham Review.
