At the Ontario convention held last week in Toronto Hon. Earl Rowe, M.P. for Dufferin-Simcoe, was chosen as the Moses to lead the Conservatives of the Province back to the promised land. Mr. Rowe is capable and willing to undertake the task and will prepare for his new duties as soon as the present session of the Dominion Parliament has ended. The only plank in the Conservative platform discussed at any length at the convention was the one relating to the repeal of the recent legislation affecting school taxes.

Live Stock Market

Over 4000 cattle arrived for Monday's market and with a good demand, trade was active and prices steady to strong. Export buyers, for shipments to the United Kingdom, took a large number of cattle, which was of considerable help to the market as a whole. Reports from American markets were to the effect that prices had declined over there and therefore were of no assistance to the present market.

Best heavy steers sold mostly at from 5.00 to 5.50, with a few tops at 5.75; common and medium from 4.50 to 5.00. Choice butcher cattle were in strong demand at from 5.00 to 5.40; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.00; common and medium 3.75 to 4.25. Choice baby heaves were active and strong at from 5.75 to 6.50, while those of medium to good quality ranged from 4.75 to 5.50. The cow trade was strong with the choice from 2.75 to 4.15; fair to good from 2.25 to 3.75; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 1.75 to 2.50. The bull trade held steady with choice from 2.50 to 4.00; bolognas 3.00 to 3.25.

Monday's supplies of lambs were the largest of the year so far from Ontario shippers and the buyers commenced purchasing them by the pound, choice well-finished lambs selling at 12.00 and those of medium to good quality from 9.00 to 10.00. Choice light sheep were from 2.50 to 4.00 and best heavy sheep from 2.50 to 3.00. The calf prices were slightly easier on account of liberal supplies, choice selling from 8.00 to 8.50; fair to good from 7.50 to 8.00; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50.

Although supplies of hogs were liberal, salesmen were successful in securing higher prices, ranging from 15 to 25 cents compared to the close of last week. Sales were made on the basis of 8.00 f.o.b., 3.40 to 3.50 off trucks and 3.75 off cars. The general feeling is that the market will hold active and strong throughout the balance of the week.

She passed peacefully away on Saturday.
