Local Girls Injured in Auto Accident

Travelling at a fair rate of speed the car struck loose gravel and skidded. Before it could be righted a cement butment was encountered and the car was badly wrecked. Miss Alton had her right arm broken, her ankle injured and was cut and bruised in several places. Miss Elliott was more seriously injured. She underwent an operation on Monday for inward injuries and latest reports are that she is making satisfactory progress. Dr. Burnett received several cuts about the head and face and Mr. Rennie escaped with minor injuries. Those who have seen the wrecked car express surprise that the occupants escaped with their lives.

As suggested in Mr. Kelly's letter The Standard will be pleased to forward any information or request which may be handed to us. Here is Mr. Kelly's letter:

Dear Sir,—I am proceeding to France on the Vimy Pilgrimage next month (July 16) and not knowing whether any one was going from Markdale district I felt that probably some parents whom I know have sons buried there and would like to know some data regarding the graves, etc.

I will be visiting every Canadian cemetery in France from Somme to Ypres and also in England and if I were advised by parents as to what cemetery the remains of their son lies I would sure make a special effort to visit same, take a good picture of grave and on my return home I would make a trip to Markdale (which is my intention anyway to see my mother) and will be glad to produce the photos as well as give all other information regarding the graves.

Being a Markdale boy I sure have not forgotten the old town and will be pleased to do this for the parents of the boys I knew so well and fought along with.

The Pilgrimage Committee are selling wreaths (everlasting) at \$2.25. These are secured in France. If any relatives desires one of these placed on a grave and will forward me the money I will secure same and on my return will produce receipt for same and photo after it has been placed on the grave.

I thought the Standard would get in touch with most of those who might be interested whether in the village or the locality.

They could leave all information with you and it could be sent on to me. This information should be sent along at once. Let me hear from you.

Mrs. J. S. Knechtel of Hanover is Dead

Mr. J. S. Knechtel and family were sorely grieved and Hanover lost an estimable citizen in the sudden passing of Mrs. Knechtel in the Toronto General Hospital Thursday afternoon last about 4.45. She had not been well for nearly ten years and an operation for inward goitre was performed in the Toronto hospital on Monday of last week which was successful and Mrs. Knechtel seemed to be improving splendidly until she suffered a relapse Thursday and sank rapidly, death being due to pneumonia.

The late Mrs. Knechtel was born in Albany, N.Y., on July 9, 1867, a daughter (Rosaleena) of the late Mr. and Mrs. John D. Reising. When she was eleven years of age, the family moved to Elmira, Ont., and she lived there until her marriage on February 9, 1892, to Mr. J. S. Knechtel of Hanover, since which time she has lived here.

She was a woman of broad sympathies, cheerful in disposition, and charming in manner, and, until stricken with illness, enjoyed social activities and was an esteemed friend. She took part in the work of the Baptist Church, of which she became a member with her husband, though her connection in early life was with the Lutheran Church, and she was a patroness of the local Girl Guide organization, and extended much help to it, as well as assisting with other community work.

Left to mourn her sudden passing are her husband and five children, Renata (Mrs. H. H. Lucas), Xenia, Karl, Fritz and Max. There are nine grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. W. Dash of Kipling, Sask.

The funeral took place last Sunday afternoon from her late residence to the Hanover cemetery, and the esteem in which deceased was held was testified by the mass of floral tributes and the presence of a large concourse of friends who thus paid their last tribute of love and respect. The services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Thomas E. Richards.—Hanover Post.
