## Dr. J. A. McArthur is Liberal Candidate

At an enthusiastic meeting of the Liberal Association of South Grey, held here Monday afternoon, Dr. J. A. McArthur of Markdale was the unanimous choice of the convention to contest the riding of South Grey at the next provincial election. Approximately one hundred delegates from the various municipalities in the riding were present, and there was the enthusiasm of victory in evidence when Dr. McArthur accepted the nomination.

This was also the annual meeting, and during the business session the following officers were elected for the coming year:

President, Dr. T. H. Sneath, Durham; 1st Vice-President, John A. Patterson, Hanover; 2nd Vice-President, Dr. McAlister, Dundalk; 3rd Vice-President, Mrs. J. A. McArthur, Markdale; Secretary-Treasurer, W. E. Harris, Markdale.

The selection of Dr. McArthur at this early date has spiked the rumor that the sitting member, F. R. Oliver, who has so far run under the U.F.O. banner, was to switch his allegiance and make a bid for the Liberal convention for the next contest. It is a well-known fact that Mr. Oliver has been a consistent supporter of the government in power, and for his allegiance in the vote for increased grants to the Separate schools a pretty well-founded rumor says that he has been given the patronage of the riding by Premier Hepburn.

However, the nomination of Dr. McArthur pretty well shows the minds of the Liberals of South Grey, and that they are determined to have a candidate of their own choosing in the fray when the writs are issued for the next election.—The Durham Chronicle.

## Notes Re Extrace Exams. Held Recently

In the entire Inspectorate of South Grey, including Osprey township, there were 444 candidates prepared. Of these 174 were granted standing on their year's work, while 173 passed the test set by the Education Department. Thus a total of 347 obtained the grade, or about 75 per cent.

Of the 444 who were prepared 107 were from the six urban schools and 96 passed, or almost 90 per cent. Almost all of those intend going on to High School.

Of the 327 from the rural schools 241 passed, or 78 per cent. It is to be regretted that only a small percentage of those intend going on to High School. If transportation could be provided a very large percentage of the rural children would arrange to go.

The winner of the Dr. Jamieson gold medal, given through the generosity of Dr. Jamieson of Durham, is Keith Beaton, a pupil of Mr. Dan Firth of No. 1, Glenelg. Keith received the highest mark in the Inspectorate.
