First Prosecution Under Sanitary Control

Mr. W. R. Graham of Glenelg appeared before Police Magistrate here on Friday last charged with a breach of the law in connection with the sanitary control area, in that he is said to have between one hundred and one hundred and fifty pigs which have access to the stream in the area set aside under sanitary control by the Ontario Department of Health. The case was adjourned until Monday at Owen Sound when considerable evidence was heard. The presiding magistrate reserved his decision until Friday. Messrs. C. F. Leatherland and W. S. Middlebro appeared for the corporation of Markdale while Barrister McKay defended Mr. Graham.

Orangemen at Church Service on Sunday

Members of L.O.L. No. 1045 and visitors from Orange Valley lodge attended Christ Church in a body on Sunday morning, July 12th. The extremely hot weather did not prevent a large attendance. Speaking on II Cor. 3 : 17, Rev. C. O. Mrs. Andrew L. Walker is Laid to Rest

On Tuesday afternoon, July 14th, a large concourse of friends gathered at the spacious residence of Mr. A. L. Walker, Markdale, to pay tribute to Mrs. Walker, who passed peacefully away on Sunday evening at the age of 71 years. On the tenth of December 1884, she whose maiden name was Margaret Donnelly, became the bride of Andrew L. Walker and during a happy married life of almost 54 years she proved a true friend, wise counsellor and devoted companion. After a sojourn in Glenelg and Toronto, Mr. and Mrs. Walker moved to Markdale where they have since resided. But in whichever home she lived her life suggested Wordsworth's lines: "The lake, the bay, the waterfall And thou the spirit of them all."

Mrs. Walker early in life became a member of the Church and for years was a faithful and valued worker of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, being for over 40 years actively identified with the Ladies' Aid thereof. In later years Mrs. Walker has been associated with Annesley United Church and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. By the cordiality with which she welcomed all visitors to her home; by the graciousness of her manner and the kindness of her disposition she endeared herself to all who had the privilege of her friendship. Love for her Church and love for her Master combined to make her Christian Witness both beautiful and impressive.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. H. S. Warren, who chose as his text Hebrews 13 : 5, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", because in that promise may be found comfort for sorrowing hearts, while in its fulfilment lies the secret of the strength and beauty of the life now closed.

The sympathy of the entire community is extended to husband and son, to mother and sister in this hour of loss and loneliness. The many floral tributes were beautiful with their expressions of love and esteem.
