Carruthers - Miller—That on account of this Council demanding payment of accounts by individual cheques and the Government adding additional work to the Treasurer this Council add fifty dollars to the Treasurer's salary.—Carried.

Pottage - Parker—That the members of this Council assist the rate-

payers of Rocklyn who have offered to give their time free of charge to improve the road from Rocklyn to Temple Hill Highway.—Carried.
