Live Stock Market Report

(By Dunn & Levack, Toronto)

Following the extreme hot weather and a very slow cattle market last week the trade has improved considerably this week and a good clearance has been made to-day. Tuesday, prices being from 15 to 25 cents higher than on Monday. Export buyers of cattle for the Old Country took care of a large number of well finished cattle and packer buyers also were in need of some butcher cattle. Stockers and feeders were very slow of sale and quite a number were unsold at the close.

Choice weighty steers brought from 5.40 to 5.65, with a few tops slightly higher; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.25. Choice butcher steers and heifers ranged from 4.50 to 4.75 with some closing sales at 5.00; fair to good from 4.00 to 4.40; common and medium 3.25 to 3.75. The choice fed calves sold at from 5.75 to 6.50; others lower according to quality. The cow market was easier on Monday but recovered on Tuesday, with choice cows from 3.25 to 3.50; fair to good 2.50 to 3.00; common 2.00 to 2.25; canners 1.75. The bull trade was slow from 3.00 to 3.25 for the best kind; others from 2.50 to 3.00.

Lamb prices opened at \$5.00 but recovered to \$7.75 on Tuesday for the best kind, with prospects of a better price on Wednesday. Choice sheep were slow of sale at 2.50 to 3.00. The calf market has been active and steady at last week's close, choice from 6.50 to 7.00; fair to good 6.00 to 6.50; common and medium 5.00 to 6.00; grass calves 3.25.

The hog market has held steady and with a good demand sales were readily made at from 9.00 to 9.25 for truck deliveries. Prospects are steady for the balance of the week.
