

### Weed Spraying Demonstration in Markdale

Tuesday the Weed Sprayers went over some of the streets of Markdale in an endeavor to destroy the weeds. The work was one of the projects sponsored by the Markdale Horticultural Society.

The chemicals used were 112 lbs. of sodium chlorate and 65 lbs. of calcium chloride. These were mixed with 150 gallons of water and applied with a power sprayer working under 400 pounds pressure.

The weeds should show the effect in the course of a few days. The spray not only destroys the plant above ground but the root in addition.

The Markdale project is just one of many applied by several of Grey county townships.

You now reside only a few miles from the old scenes, and we are very glad that our homes are not far separated.

We appreciate your labors during the past fifty years and your influence over us, also your untiring efforts of the present time, and may it please God to have you remain among us for many years to come, and as you journey on together may the pathway of life grow brighter as toward a beautiful sunset after a day of toil.

### Charles Ramage, Editor Durham Review, Dead

Charles Ramage, editor of the Durham Review and one of Durham's most highly esteemed citizens, passed away at his home on Friday morning at 11 a.m., in his 88th year. The late Mr. Ramage had been ailing in health for a few months past and seriously ill since he suffered a stroke a week ago.

The late Mr. Ramage was a native of Heddington, Scotland, and was eighteen years of age when he came to Canada. He learned the printing trade in Scotland. On his arrival here he worked for six months on a paper at Priceville. He then attended High School at Collingwood and for thirteen years taught school, until he purchased the Durham Review forty-two years ago. Under his guiding hand the Review gained an enviable position among the weekly newspapers of the district.

The late Mr. Ramage had been a resident of Durham for the past forty-four years and during that time had won the esteem and respect of all with whom he came in contact.

The late Mr. Ramage was united in marriage over 52 years ago to Mary Jane Coleridge of Egremont Township, who now survives to mourn his passing. Six children also survive, Miss Alice Ramage and Peter, at home, Dr. Charles C. Ramage of Gorrie, Mrs. R. J. McKnight of Wainfleet, Ont., Arthur of Thornbury, editor of the Review-Herald there, and Harold of the Petrolia Advertiser-Topic. One daughter, Mary, predeceased her father.

One brother, William Ramage of Priceville who is four and a half years younger than the deceased, survives. One sister died before the family came from Scotland. Four grandchildren also survive.

The funeral of the late Mr. Ramage was held on Sunday afternoon and was largely attended. Rev. W. H. Smith, pastor of Knox United Church had charge of the services at the home and church. Interment was made in Durham cemetery.
