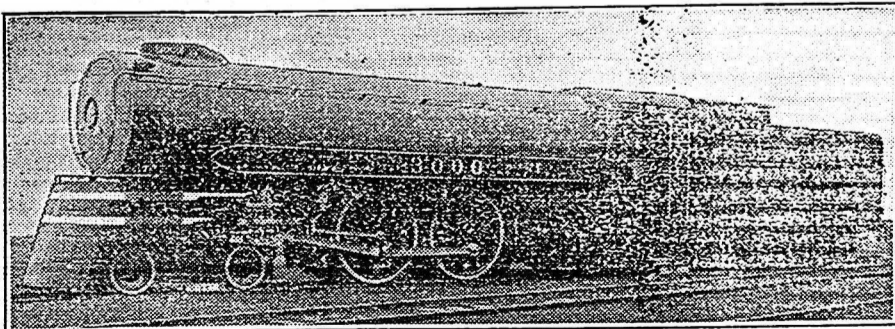

## New Locomotives Poems in Steel



Canada's newest railway locomotives are poems in steel, graceful, light-weight, semi-streamlined, machines capable of 110 miles an hour. Radical departures in construction have been made in the Canadian Pacific Railway's five new "3000" engines, the first of which was taken over on Monday, July 27, at a brilliant ceremony which was broadcast on a nation-wide radio net-work through the facilities of the company's Communications Department, and which included addresses by Sir Edward Beatty, G.B.E., K.C., L.L.D., chairman and president, Canadian Pacific Railway; His Worship Mayor Camillien Houde of Montreal; William C. Dickerman, president of the Montreal Locomotive Company, where the new locomotive was built; and J. N. Burke, Canadian Pacific veteran. The new Jubilee Locomotives, so named because they will go into operation in the jubilee year of the company's transcontinental passenger service, will pull a completely new type of train, lighter than the ordinary, semi-streamlined, and comfortable. The new coaches are under construction.
