Pottage - Miller-That this Council let contract for eavetrough and conductor on township hall to Harvey McQuarrie for \$11.13 .- Cd.

Parker - Pottage-That Treasurer pay Andrew Myles \$50.00, accident insurance policy.—Cd.

Parker - Pottage-That cheque for \$25.89 from Ed. Lanktree be received and handed to Treasurer and that the Treasurer receive a copy of this resolution .- Carried.

Miller - Parker-That this Coun cil be a committee to investigate the hill on the third line to give Kaake Bros. access to their property.-Cd.

The following accounts were or-dered paid: H. Thompson, caretaker of hall, \$5.00; Geo. McConnell, Sanitary Inspector for 1934-5-6, \$14.27: Frank Davis, sheep killed by dogs, \$7.00; John Clark, sheep killed by dogs, \$2.50; Pay Sheet No. 68, No. 71, \$66.10; No. 72, \$45.67; \$23.80; No. 73, \$38.70; \$115.20; No. 75, \$142.20; No. 76, \$27.15; No. 77, \$125.10; No. 78, No. 79, \$44.80; No. 80, \$75.53; \$9.80; No. S1, \$35.S0.

The following estimates were decided upon by a committee of the Council for 1936: whole rate, \$18,975.00; salaries, \$1000.00; stationery, etc., \$200.00: election \$100.00; indigent, \$100.00; Board of Health, \$150.00; legal, \$10.00; grants to .Agricultural Societies \$100.00; schools, \$9000.00; roads and bridges, \$3200.00; miscellanous, \$141.00; total \$32976.00.

The above amount, \$32976.00, must be raised by taxation on all the rateable property of the Township, consequently a rate of 18 mills on the dollar will require to be levied and collected in addition to all school monies required by trustees in addition to the Township grant and a By-Law rates.
