RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All flowers must be grown by exhibitor. Exception to this rule will disqualify any exhibit in the hall.
2. No exhibit will be entitled to a prize unless worthy, even if it is the only entry in the class.
3. Every person eligible to exhibit.
4. No entry fee will be charged.
5. Entries must be sent to the Department of Agriculture by noon on August 24th.
6. Only one entry allowed in each class by each exhibitor.
7. No person will be allowed in the place of exhibition at the time of judging except the necessary assistants. Public admitted at 4 o'clock on August 24th. Open all day August 25th.
8. ALL FLOWERS MUST BE ARRANGED AND READY FOR JUDGING AT 1.30 P.M. SHARP ON AUGUST 24. ALL EXHIBITS MUST REMAIN ON DISPLAY UNTIL 9.00 O'CLOCK P.M. AUGUST 25.

All Exhibitors Must Provide Containers

RULES FOR CLASS 39

1. Any boy or girl going to school, who has not passed the Entrance previous to 1936 may compete - this means that a boy or girl who tried the Entrance this year is still eligible.
2. The bird house must be suitable for a named bird.
3. No entry fee is charged.
4. The bird house must be left at the Show until exhibits are removed, according to regulations.
