#### Live Stock Market Report

On Monday the cattle market opened with a good demand for practically all classes and prices were more satisfactory, compared to recent declines. The cattle on offer were of a better class and anything show finished and quality, sold at satisfactory prices, while those of medium quality showed a wide range in values, depending largely upon whether they were suitable for killing purposes or for further feeding. The export outlet was very confined, but on Tuesday next, there will be a demand for cattle weighting 1050 lbs. and up, for shipment to the Old Country. The market will be closed on Monday.

Best heavy steers brought from 5.50 to 6.00; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.40; common and medium 4.00 to 4.50. Choice butcher cattle made from 5.00 to 5.40; fair to good 4.50 to 4.90; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. Choice baby beeves brought from 6.75 to 7.50, others lower according to quality. Stockers and feeders were in strong demand, only a few of the best were available, selling from 3.25 to 3.75; common and medium 2.50 to 3.60. The cow trade was active and a shade strong er, best fat rows bringing from 2.75 to 3.25; fair to good from 2.25 to 2.65; common and medium 1.75 to 2.25; canners and cutter 1:00 to 1.75. The lamb market opened slow, as salesmen endeavored to raise the price. Very little business was done until noon-hour and sales of best lambs ranged from 8.25 to 8.50, with fair to good from 8.00 to 8.25. Tuesday the market held steady, most of the truck deliveries selling at 8.00, with the bucks at from 7.00 to 7.25. All classes of sheep held steady. The calf market was active and higher, choice veal calves bringing from 8.00 to 8.50; fair to good from 7.00 to 7.75; common and medium 5.50 to 6.50.

With liberal supplies of hogs a all centres, prices worked lower on Monday, but have held steady today, truck deliveries selling at from 8.85 to 9.10, which is equal to 12.10 graded on the rail, of which there was a very small number. It is expected hog prices will hold steady for the balance of the week.
