Mrs. J. Thompson of Embro, a former resident, called on a number of old friends one day last week.

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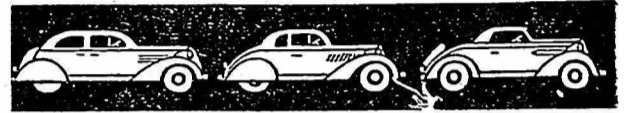
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Special Edition for Markdale Fall Fair
