FRENCH MUSTARD PICKLES

2 qt. cucumbers, peeled and cut finely
 2 qt. large onions, cut finely
 1 qt. small pickling onions
 1 qt. medium sized cucumbers, cut lengthwise
 1 large cauliflower, cut in small pieces
 Put above in dish, sprinkle with salt. Let stand over night, then drain.

Add:
 7 cups white sugar
 3/4 gal. cider vinegar
 1/4 lb. white mustard seed
 1/8 lb. celery seed
 Boil all together for a short time, then add 3 hot peppers and 3 sweet red peppers, cut in fine strips. Continue to cook until almost done; then add very slowly the following paste: 1/2 lb. mustard; 2/3 cup flour; 1/2 oz. tumeric powder mixed together with cold vinegar. Boil for a few more minutes.

1 gallon white wine vinegar
 2 lbs. brown sugar
 1/4 lb. tin Keen's mustard
 1 oz. curry powder
 1 cup salt
 1/2 lb. white mustard seed
 15 cents worth of saccharine

1 teaspoon red pepper
 cucumbers
 Cauliflowers
 Small onions
 Mix all together in a large crock and crop in little cucumbers, cauliflowers and small onions, cut up small and stir often for 30 days. Cover crock with a plate to keep pickles under vinegar.

FRUIT CAKE

2 cups brown sugar
 2/3 cup shortening
 2 cups water
 2 cups raisins
 2 cups currants
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 1 teaspoon cloves
 1 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/2 teaspoon allspice
 1 cup flour
 2 small teaspoons soda
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1 1/2 cups nut meats
 Mix brown sugar, shortening, water, raisins, currants, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, allspice and salt together and cook for 3 minutes. Cool and add flour, soda, baking powder and nut meats. Bake in 2 well greased loaf tins 45 minutes in moderate oven. Will keep indefinitely.

2/3 cup brown sugar
 1/2 cup butter
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1 tablespoon sour milk
 1 cup boiled raisins
 1/2 cup raisin water
 1 1/2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 Cream the sugar, butter and add egg, beat well. Mix dry ingredients and add alternately with raisin water. Then add baking soda dissolved with sour milk and last of all add the raisins.
