Michael Ryan, a native of Irish Lake district, passed away in the General Hospital at Stratford, on Sunday following an illness of about two weeks. He was in the lumber business.

The late Mr. Ryan, who was unmarried, is survived by two brothers and one sister: W. F. Ryan in Toronto; James Ryan in Spokane; Mrs. Thomas Moran of the Glenelg-Holland townline.

The remains were brought to the home of his sister from where the funeral took place Tuesday morning, with Mass in St. John's Church in Glenelg conducted by Rev. Father Grace. Interment was made in St. John's Church cemetery.

Live Stock Market Report

The cattle trade was active on Monday for those of choice quality, mainly steers, while heifers met with a slow trade. Export buyers took care of a large number of cattle for shipment to the Old Country, including some bulls, all of which was of considerable help to the market as a whole. Over 3000 cattle arrived from Western Canada, consisting mostly of stockers and feeders, which met with a fair trade excepting for the common and medium class.

Choice heavy steers brought from 5.75 to 6.25; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.50. Choice light butcher cattle made from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good 2.75 to 3.25; common 2.25 to 2.50. The cow trade held active and steady, choice from 3.00 to 3.50; fair to good from 2.50 to 3.00; common and medium 2.00 to 2.50; canners and cutters 1.25 to 2.00. Choice heavy bulls brought from 3.00 to 3.25, bolognas from 2.50 to 3.00.

Supplies of lambs are light for this season of the year and prices have held steady, choice ewes sold at 8.00 W.O.C. and truck deliveries at 7.75, bucks 6.75 to 7.00. Choice light butcher sheep held steady at 3.50 to 4.00, others lower according to quality. The calf trade held active and strong, choice from 8.00 to 8.50; fair to good 7.00 to 7.75; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50.

In the hog department, prices have worked lower, supplies were heavy at all centres and Old Country reports were lower. Truck deliveries of hogs sold at 8.10 to 8.25.
