### BRAN MUFFINS

1/2 to 1 cup brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/2 cups bran  
1 1/2 cups flour  
Pinch of salt  
1 cup sour cream  
1 teaspoon soda  
Raisins or dates if desired  
Mix sugar and egg; mix bran, flour and salt and then mix together and add raisins or dates. Add sour cream to which soda has been added.

### PEPPER PASTE

1 large head cabbage  
6 medium sized onions  
9 green peppers  
6 red peppers, hot  
3 red peppers, sweet  
1/2 cup salt  
3/4 cup white mustard seed  
1 tablespoon celery seed  
1 quart white sugar  
White wine vinegar.  
Put cabbage, onions and peppers all through chopper and add salt, let stand over night. In the morning drain well and add mustard seed, celery seed and white sugar and cover with white wine vinegar. Let stand on the back of stove until the sugar is well dissolved; do not boil. Seal well.

### LINDBERG RELISH

2 large cabbages  
5 medium carrots  
12 medium onions  
2 red peppers  
2 green peppers  
1/2 cup salt  
1 quart strong Vinegar  
2 tablespoons white mustard seed  
1 tablespoon celery seed  
6 cups white sugar.  
Put the vegetables through the food chopper, work in salt and let drain well. Put in a crock and stir in vinegar, mustard seed, celery seed and white sugar. This does not need cooking or sealing and can be used in about a week. It will keep indefinitely.

### MUSTARD CHOW-CHOW

8 large cucumbers  
9 onions  
12 large green tomatoes  
1 head cabbage  
salt  
3 cups vinegar  
4 cups granulated sugar  
3 tablespoons flour  
2 1/2 tablespoons mustard

1/2 teaspoon tumeric  
Chop cucumbers, onions, tomatoes and cabbage fine, add 1 handful salt and let stand 3 hours. Drain and add vinegar and sugar. Let come to a boil. Add flour, mustard, tumeric moistened with cold water. Boil 10 minutes and bottle while hot.

### CATSUP SPICE

12 lbs. ripe tomatoes  
4 cups of vinegar  
4 cups brown sugar  
1/2 teaspoon red pepper  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves  
2 tablespoons salt.

Peel tomatoes and boil until half gone; put through ricer and add vinegar, brown sugar, pepper, cinnamon, cloves and salt and boil all half hour. Seal hot.

### MUSTARD PICKLE

1 qt. onions  
1 qt. ripe cucumbers  
1 qt. green cucumbers  
1 cauliflower  
1 qt. small onions  
6 cups brown sugar  
1/4 teaspoon celery seed  
1 1/2 qts. white vinegar  
1/2 cup flour  
2 oz. mustard  
1 teaspoon tumeric.

Put onions, ripe cucumbers and green cucumbers through chopper, pull cauliflower in small pieces and leave small onions whole and cover this with a strong salt brine; let stand a few hours, drain, wrench in clear water and add brown sugar, celery seed and vinegar. Mix separate flour, mustard and tumeric and mix with cold vinegar; add to the pickles and boil all ten minutes.
