"The World's Fair" at Rocklyn on Thursday and Friday last was the best in years and the weatherman smiled graciously on the exhibition.

The horse and cattle classes were well filled and competitions were keen and were eagerly watched by a large crowd. The judging of horses was not completed until dusk, and every class was filled with the exception of the road team class, which only had one entry. The cattle at the show were all one could hope for in quality. The animals in the Durham, Hereford, Poiled nggus, Holstein and Jersey classes were of a high order and in the "march past" the herds showed up to god advantage and were a revelation to lovers of good stock.

The ladies' classes in the inside show were not as numerous as formerly, while the root and dairy sections were above the average.

The school work, drills and marching were a feature with the children and parents, and held attention while in progress.

The special races and attractions were exciting features and added pep to the afternoon program.

President J. S. Falls and Secretary E. Lanktree felt fully repaid for the close attention given to the assembling of the products of the various

sections competing. The Fair this year created new hopes, new ideals, and a fervent desire to do better as the years roll by. With the many setbacks experienced by the Rocklyn management, one must admire the determination of its officers.

Orangeville Man Killed in Motor Accident

Samuel Walker, aged 35, was killed on Sunday afternoon last in an accident at the corner of No. 10 sideroad and the Second Line, Melancthon (Masonville corner) about five miles north east of Shelburne, when his car was in collision with one driven by Miss Ila Fell, aged 25, of Dundalk. Both cars were turned over and Walker's was facing in the opposite direction from which he had come as a result of the impact. Walker was killed almost instantly. He lived in Orangeville.

Miss Fell suffered a fractured shoulder and her sister, Edith, the only other passenger, injuries to her back. Both were taken to hospital in Owen Sound. Herbert Allen of Violet Hill, in Walker's car, jumped when he saw a collision inevitable, and escaped injury.

Miss Fell's car was travelling east on the sideroad and the other car was going north when the collision occurred at the intersection.
