Orangeville Man Killed in Motor Accident

Samuel Walker, aged 35, was killed on Sunday afternoon last in an accident at the corner of No. 10 sideroad and the Second Line, Melancthon (Masonville corner) about five miles north east of Shelburne, when his car was in collision with one driven by Miss Ila Fell, aged 25. of Dundalk. Both cars were turned over and Walker's was facing in the opposite direction from which he had come as a result of the impact Walker was killed al-He lived in Ormost instantly. angeville.

Miss Fell suffered a fractured shoulder and her sister, Edith, the only other passenger, injuries to her back. Both were taken to hospital Herbert Allen of in Owen Sound. Violet Hill, in Walker's car, jumped when he saw a collision inevitable, and escaped injury.

Miss Fell's car was travelling east on the sideroad and the other car was going north when the collision occurred at the intersection.
