The horse show was well up to the best years and many fine animals were paraded before the judges. Never in the history of the Society was the cattle show so interesting and attractive. The skating rink was used for housing the cattle and it makes an ideal spot for such. The judging was done there and the fine animals were viewed by many spectators. The showing of sheep and swine was up to the average and many good birds were shown in the poultry classes.

The inside exhibits were simply grand. The armouries has never been graced with a better showing. All classes were well filled and exhibits by local dealers added much to the attractions of the interior. Special mention should be made of the splendid exhibit of flowers under the direction of the local Horticultural Society.

There was a big midway which provided amusement for many and the several races and other special attractions kept the crowd in good humor during the entire afternoon. Owen Sound Boys' Band provided music liberally during the afternoon.

In the evening Tom Hamilton and his company pleased a large crowd in the armouries and a dance was held following the concert.

The officials worked hard for a successful fair and their efforts were rewarded. The Fall Fair Edition of The Standard was the only advertising used to promote the event and it worked splendidly. The little machine was put into action and those present were convinced that dimensional power is an accomplished fact. There is apparently nothing elaborate in the construction of the machine but the power is developed and plenty of it. One little model weighing about two pounds could not be held by a man when the movement started. The invention is controlled by the Canadian Life Brotherhood, an organization over which Rev. Mr. Ferry presides. Our prediction is that the machine will do much to revolutionize conditions in Canada and that the organization in whose hands it is held will be a big factor in Canadian life.
