County School Field Day Held at Dundalk

Markdale High School was placed second to Durham in the third annual Interscholastic Athletic Meet held in Dundalk on Thursday. Hanover, dethroned after a two-year reign, finished in third place with Flesherston, Thornbury, Dundalk, Feversham and Chatsworth trailing.

Markdale won the cup for the highest number of points scored in the girls' division while Durham carried off the silverware for the boys.

The high scorers for Markdale were Alice and Devona Cutting who secured the bronze medal emblematic of the runner-up for the senior championship and the silver medal of the junior girls' championship respectively.

Markdale boys provided the runners-up with Gordon Henderson, in the senior division, and Sidney Borinsky, in the junior, securing the bronze medals.

Several records were shattered at this year's meet. The junior shot-put mark was extended to 42 feet 3 1/2 inches; the juniors cleared five feet in the high jump; S. Borinsky ran the junior 100-yard dash in the new record time of 11.4 seconds, equalling the senior time for the same distance. The seniors equalled the pole vault record of 10 feet, and established the new time of 26 seconds for the 220-yard dash. Alice Cutting broke the record for senior girls' high jump at four feet six inches. The juniors, Devona Cutting and Jane Noble, made a record in catch ball of 121 catches in two minutes.

Markdale point winners in the meet were as follows: Senior boys, G. Henderson, second in the 100-yard dash, second in the 12-lb shot-put; K. White, second in the broad jump; W. Henderson, second in the discus-throw.

Junior boys: S. Borinsky was a double winner, taking firsts in the 100-yard dash and 220-yard dash.

Senior Girls: A. Cutting, first in the high jump, first in the softball throw; E. Kinney, third in the 100-yard dash; E. Kinney and H. Carefoot, second in catch ball.

Junior Girls: M. Thompson and E. Kinney, first in the three-legged race; D. Cutting, first in the softball throw; D. Cutting and J. Noble, first in catch ball.

Relay races counted points for the school and not for the individual. Senior girls, second: E. Kinney, R. Alton, H. Wiley, I. Boyd. Junior girls, third: E. Kinney, J. Noble, M. Thompson, M. Carefoot.

Grey Presbytery Met at Thornbury

Marking the first time in local history of the United Church of Canada, Grey Presbytery of that denomination met in Grace Church, Thornbury on Tuesday for the annual deliberation of that body. Representatives from each of the 37 pastoral charges in the County were present. In all about seventy ministers and laymen attended. Morning and afternoon sessions were held, the ladies of the Church serving mid-day and evening meals for the visitors.

Succeeding Rev. H. S. Warren of Markdale, the Presbytery chose during the election of officers at the morning session, Rev. A. N. Cooper of Hanover as the Chairman for the coming term. No other name was submitted, the election being made unanimous. The new secretary is Rev. A. Rintoul of Chatsworth, and the treasurer is again Mr. W. L. Young of Markdale. Committees were also appointed to carry out the work of the coming year. The ministerial retreat scheduled Monday in Grace Church, was postponed to a later date, Owen Sound being substituted. At this retreat ministers will have the pleasure of hearing Rev. Geo. Pidgeon, minister of Bloor Street United Church, Toronto, and former Moderator of the Church.

During the session, Rev. H. S. Warren of Markdale and Mr. Peter Muir of Priceville gave a report of the General Council proceedings of the United Church at Ottawa. Mrs. (Rev.) T. R. White of Heathcote addressed the Presbytery along the lines of organizing a County Women's Association to strengthen the individual body and as well to link up activities in a closer bond of unity. Rev. Dr. Williams of Toronto spoke on Home and Foreign Mission work.

Presbytery took cognizance of the Western Relief situation, and instead of carrying on relief work along denominational lines, the Church bearing the main brunt of the organizing shipments of supplies last year, it will throw all its efforts behind community endeavors.

Of the 37 ministers in the Presbytery, eight are new pulpits incumbents. Rev. W. Smith of Durham holds the distinction of being the longest stationed minister at one centre, his term being sixteen years.

Live Stock Market Report

Almost 7000 cattle arrived over the week-end for Tuesday's market, including 4500 cattle and calves from Western Canada. Choice butcher cattle held active and steady, while those of medium quality were slow of sale. There was a good enquiry for stockers and feeders of select breed and quality.

Best heavy steers brought from 5.25 to 5.75; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.15; common and medium 3.50 to 4.00. Choice light butcher cattle sold at from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good 4.00 to 4.60; common and medium 3.00 to 4.00. The choice baby heaves were in strong demand at from 7.00 to 8.00; others at lower prices according to quality. Selected light stockers sold at from 3.25 to 3.75 and feeders from 3.75 to 4.50; common and medium stockers ranged from 2.50 to 3.00. The cow trade was slow, choice cows bringing from 2.75 to 3.00; fair to good from 2.25 to 2.65; common and medium 1.75 to 2.25; canners and cutters 1.00 to 1.75. Bulls were slow of sale, only a few of the best heavy kind bringing from 3.00 to 3.25; heavy bolognas sold at from 2.50 to 2.75 and light bolognas 2.25 to 2.50.

The lamb market held active and strong. Car-load shipments of the choice lots brought from 8.00 to 8.25 and truck deliveries mostly at 7.75, with a few of extra quality up to 8.00. All classes of sheep held steady. Choice veal calves sold at from 8.00 to 8.50; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.00; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50; grass calves 3.50; heavy calves very slow of sale.

Hog deliveries were very heavy at all centres and the market lost the gain of a week ago. Truck deliveries sold at from 8.10 to 8.25. It is expected that prices will work lower.
