HYDRO FOR BADJEROS

Hydro electric power for the village of Badjeros in the very near future will be a reality. A canvass has been made by Mr. Harry Sippell during the past week and more than the required three contracts to the mile have been signed to bring the power line from Honeywood via Redickville and Maple Valley. A deputation of four, namely: Messrs. Harry Sippell, Lewis Moore, Ed. Breadner and John Allen went to Toronto on Saturday and interviewed the Provincial Hydro Commission. They were given every assurance that the line would be built and an official of the Commission will look over the route of the proposed line this week. They were also assured that all the local labor possible would be used in building the line and paid for at the regular wage. The officials also estimated that the line will be completed by the middle of December.—Dundalk Herald.
