Live Stock Market Report

Almost 7000 cattle were on sale for Monday's market and with a good demand prices held steady on well finished cattle, while those of medium quality were slightly lower. A large percentage of the offering consisted of stockers and feeders for which there was a good demand.
 Choice heavy steers ranged from 5.50 to 5.75, with a few tops at 6.00; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.40; common and medium 3.50 to 4.50. In the butcher section baby beefs were slightly lower on account of heavy receipts of this class from Western Canada. Those of choice quality brought from 7.50 to 8.00; others from 5.50 to 7.00, according to quality. Choice butcher steers and heifers ranged from 5.00 to 5.25 and a few extras at 5.50; fair to good from 4.25 to 4.90; common and medium 3.00 to 4.00. Selected light stockers sold at from 3.25 to 3.75 and those of heavier weights from 4.00 to 4.50; fair to good light stockers from 2.75 to 3.25; common 2.25 to 2.50. Choice butcher cows were in strong demand at from 3.00 to 3.25; fair to good from 2.50 to 3.00; common and medium 1.75 to 2.40; canners and cutters 1.25 to 1.75. The bull trade held steady with bolognas from 2.50 to 2.75; choice heavy exporters 3.00 to 3.25.
 The lamb market held active and strong, choice ewes selling from 7.75 to 8.00, with the bucks at 6.75 to 7.00. Best light sheep brought 3.50 to 4.50. Choice veal calves were in strong demand at from 8.00 to 9.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.00; common, and medium 5.00 to 6.50; heavy calves 3.50 to 4.25.
 Supplies of hogs during the past week in Ontario have been the heaviest on record since the year 1928. Trading was slow and prices marked lower, truck deliveries sell on Monday at 7.75, which is the lowest price recorded for some time.
