Christopher Knott Died at Meaford

Christopher Knott, well known and highly esteemed resident of the Meaford district for practically all his life, passed away on Saturday morning, Oct. 31st, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. H. Hawkins, St. Vincent Street, Meaford. Deceased, who was in his 89th year, suffered a stroke a week ago.

A native of Sligo, Ireland, the late Mr. Knott came to Canada with his father when he was thirteen years old. He lived in the Meaford district for the rest of his life, farming until retiring and moving to Meaford seventeen years ago. His many friends in that district will learn of his passing with deep regret. The late Mr. Knott was an enthusiastic fisherman and gardener.

Deceased was twice married, his first wife, Rachel Crabtree, predeceasing him about 37 years ago. There were two children by this marriage, Mrs. Robert Stuart, who resides in Thornbury, and Dawson Knott, who predeceased his father last June.

Mr. Knott was later united in marriage to Mary Elizabeth Best, who predeceased him sixteen years ago. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from her late residence to St. John's United Church, where service was held, interment following in the Flesherton Cemetery.
