Live Stock Market Report

The cattle market has been disappointing on account of lower bids for well finished cattle. For almost a week trading has been very slow because of the arrival of large numbers of cattle from Western Canada and which have affected the price of our local Ontario cattle. Stocker and feeder trade has been satisfactory, also cows have sold readily.

Only a few lots of choice heavy steers brought from 5.25 to 5.50, with the bulk of the sales ranging from 4.75 to 5.25; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. In the butcher section prices are fully from a quarter to a half lower, the choice handy weight cattle selling from 4.50 to 4.75; fair to good from 4.00 to 4.50; common and medium 3.00 to 3.75; very common 2.50 to 2.75. Choice baby heaves ranged from 7.00 to 8.00; others downward according to quality. Selected light stockers sold at from 3.25 to 3.75; fair to good from 2.75 to 3.25. Selected feeders weighing from 700 to 850 brought from 3.75 to 4.25. Choice butcher cows sold at from 3.00 to 3.25, with a few tops at 3.50; fair to good 2.50 to 3.00; common 1.90 to 2.35; canners and cutters 1.25 to 1.75. The bull trade held steady, with light bolognas 2.25 to 2.50; heavies from 2.50 to 2.75, and choice bulls from 3.00 to 3.25.

The lamb market held strong, choice ewes selling from 7.75 to 8.00, with the bucks at from 6.75 to 7.00. All classes of sheep held steady. Choice veal calves brought from 8.00 to 8.50; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.00; grass calves 3.00 to 3.50.

The hog market has worked lower due to continued liberal supplies and all markets are reported from 25 to 35 cents lower, although Toronto market held well showing a decline of from 15 to 25 cents. Closing sales of truck hogs on Tuesday were 7.50.
