Live Stock Market Report

Over 5000 cattle arrived for the market on Monday and with a good demand, cattle of good to choice quality sold at higher prices. Export buyers for shipment overseas were a prominent factor in taking care of quite a large number of cattle, which had a good effect on the market as a whole. Choice heavy steers sold at from 5.25 to 5.75; fair to good 4.50 to 5.15; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. In the butcher section choice steers and heifers ranged from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.00 to 4.60; common and medium 3.00 to 4.00. Choice baby heaves brought from 7.00 to 7.50; others lower according to quality. The cow trade was somewhat slow but prices held about steady with choice from 3.00 to 3.25; fair to good 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 1.50 to 2.25. The bull trade held steady with the choice butcher bulls from 3.00 to 3.25; bolognas from 2.50 to 2.75. The lamb market was active and strong with choice from 7.75 to 8.00 and a few tops at 8.25. All classes of sheep held steady with choice from 4.00 to 4.50. The calf market was stronger, especially for choice veal calves which brought, from 8.00 to 8.50, with a few tops at 9.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.00; common and medium 5.50 to 6.50. The hog market has gradually worked stronger and some improvement was made in prices, Monday's sales being made at from 7.65 to 7.85 off truck. It will depend entirely upon supplies for the balance of the week as to what will take place.
