Badly Injured in Crash Near Orangeville

Fred. McCutcheon of this place was badly injured in a crash between two trucks on Highway No. 10, about two miles below Orangeville on Tuesday evening. He had been to Toronto with Earl Semple in the heavy truck belonging to the Markdale Creamery and on the return trip the accident occurred. The road was very icy at the point where the accident occurred near the top of the long winding hill south of 26 sideroad, known as the Melville hill. When the Markdale truck came over the brow of the hill the driver saw another truck standing in his path a short distance down. He tried to turn his machine but owing to the slippery condition of the pavement this was impossible and the crash occurred. McCutcheon, who was sitting beside Semple, was crushed and besides having his left leg broken below the knee was cut about the head and face. Dr. White of Orangeville was called and he immediately conveyed the injured man to the Orangeville hospital where he received attention. He is at present resting fairly comfortably and it is hoped no serious complications may develop. Semple escaped injury as did the driver of the other truck, which belongs to Clifford. Several cars coming along shortly after the accident were fortunate in not being involved in further serious accidents. Both trucks were considerably damaged. Mr. Harold Borinsky of the local creamery was at the rink opening at Dundalk and immediately responded to the call from Orangeville advising him of the accident. He was in the hospital there almost as soon as the injured man and remained with him until his injuries had been attended to and he was placed in his bed.

Gordon Hamilton Badly Burned by Gasoline

Mr. Gordon Hamilton was badly burned about the face and hands on Sunday night when a pan of gasoline ignited at the farm home on Mt. Pleasant. The gasoline lamp was not working very well and the gasoline was poured into a pan in order that the lamp might be repaired. The pan was put near a lantern and it is thought the heat from the lantern caused the gasoline to ignite. In extinguishing the fire Mr. Hamilton received the burns.

Council met as per adjournment on December 12th. Members all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and passed.

The following accounts were paid by resolution: Approximately one-half of General and Trustees' levies of each school section in the Township, amounting to \$3940.03, the balance to be paid at March meeting of Council; Treasurer of Durham, payment on Town Debenture By-law re Young farm, \$21.62; Wm. Banks, balance salary as caretaker of Hall, \$10.00; Municipal World Ltd., election supplies, \$1.14; Angus McArthur, 1 sheep killed by dogs, \$6.00; Archie McKechnie, inspecting sheep, \$1.00; Glenelg Municipal Telephone System, one-half of amount levied for Maintenance Tax on subscribers, \$241.75; Mrs. Archibald, for professional attendance on Mrs. Tebbutt, \$30.00; John Fo-

Reeve, moving patient to House of Refuge \$2.00, and services re relief, \$2.00; Treasurer, making out Treasurer's Financial Statement \$15.00, balance salary \$60.00; Clerk, balance salary \$90.00, postage account \$12.00; Fred Karstedt, account for relief supplies re Jones, \$5.28; Payment Voucher No. 12, for work on roads amounting to \$280.65.

The Superintendent was instructed to procure 400 feet of snow fence for bad places on the roads.

By-law No. S16 was passed, appointing Geo. Collinson and Chris. Seigfried as School Attendance Officers for 1937 at 30 cents per hour for time employed.

The Clerk was instructed by resolution to advertise for Auditors and Assessor for 1937.

Sullivan - Newell—That rates of pay for winter work be as follows: Fifteen cents per hour for man and thirty cents per hour for man and team.

On motion of Messrs. Robinson and D'Arcy, the Reeve left the chair and the same was taken by Councillor Newell. Brief addresses were made by the Reeve and all other members of Council. The Reeve thanked the members for co-operation of the Board and wished all the Compliments of the Season. Regret was expressed by all for the decision made by Mr. Newell to quit the Board. All speakers wished the Reeve success in landing the Wardenship, not only because of the evident qualifications of Mr. McArthur for the position, but also because of the fact that Glenelg had not been represented in the Warden's chair since 1894, the position being filled in that year by the late Mr. Geo. Binnie.

The Council for 1936 adjourned.
