In Holland township the voting on Monday resulted in the re-election of John Heighes as Reeve and Geo. Hannah won out in the race for the Deputy chair. In our worry last week we neglected to report the result of the nomination on the Monday previous. For the Reeve's chair Mr. John Heighes, the 1936 occupant was opposed by Mr. Ronald

Comber, Deputy-Reeve James Howey retired and Mr. Geo. Hannah, a former Councillor, and Mr. Wilbert Sutcliffe, one of the 1936 Council qualified for the office. For the Council Messrs. Russell Dixon and Harold Gillespie of the 1936 board were re-elected by acclamation along with Robt. McFadden, a new man. Below is the voting by polls.

## Arranging For Big Events In Local Rink

Enthusiasm was keen on Wednesday evening when the business men of Markdale met to discuss arrangements for holding a few banner nights in the rink during the winter. Credit must go to Mr. G. A. Beaton, who went to the trouble to ask all those interested to attend the meeting. Mr. Beaton very briefly outlined the reasons for calling the meeting and expressed a hope that those not informed of the meeting would overlook the fact as it was gotten up in a hurry.

Mr. Beaton was elected chairman of the meeting with Mr. A. E. Hunt as secretary after which opinions were aired as to the manner in which the projected amusements could be carried out. Mr. W. Hill spoke very briefly about the lack of enthusiasm shown by some of the local business men but expressed himself as hopeful for the future and guaranteed the support of the F. T. Hill & Co. Other speakers were Father Grace, Dr. J. A. McArthur, Mr. F. D. Sawyer, Dr. L. G. Campbell and Mr. K. Goheen, all expressed themselves hopeful for success in the effort and offered their support.

It was suggested that a program of three or four evenings spread over the winter months should be devoted to entertainment in the local rink. Outstanding teams, figure skating and such amusement should be introduced and a committee composed of Mr. G. A. Beaton, Mr. F. D. Sawyer, and Mr. A. E. Hunt was appointed to make arrangements for the first night's performance. It is hoped that two outstanding Ontario hockey teams may be induced to come to Markdale for a night's game in the near future.

A second committee composed of Mr. Thos. Tuck, Mr. C. E. Leatherland, Mr. A. W. Faber and Mr. J. Colgan was elected to look after the advertising of the events. The meeting then adjourned until called together by the chairman.

This was a most enthusiastic meeting and it augurs well for the future of Markdale if such community spirit can be revived again. It is hoped that every one will give these ventures their heartiest support.

## Fred. McCutcheon Died Tuesday Evening

Frederick Elder McCutcheon, who was injured in a crash on the highway near Orangeville on Tuesday of last week, passed away on Tuesday of this week at a few minutes past eleven p.m. After entering the hospital he made splendid progress under the care of Dr. S. T. White of Orangeville and two nurses Mrs. Russell and Miss Goodram. They gave him every attention and it was hoped he was on the way to complete recovery, but infection entered the blood stream and Tuesday forenoon conditions developed which made recovery impossible. His wife and sister, Miss Laura McCutcheon, who is living in Orangeville, were also constant in their attention.

The remains were brought to the Oliver Undertaking parlors here and prepared for interment. The funeral took place Thursday afternoon from the Colgan home to Markdale cemetery. The services were in charge of Rev. T. O. Miller, pastor of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, who was assisted by Rev. C. O. Pherrill, rector of Christ Church, and Rev. R. G. Halbert of Durham, cousin of the deceased. The pallbearers were former associates in a hockey team, Messrs. Bert Hamilton, Jas. Noble, Phil Kelly, Everett Freeman, Stanley Kidd and Jack Perkins.

## Old Council Returned At Osprey Election Monday

Jas. Fawcett Heads Council Voting For Second Time When Large Vote Was Cast — Voted Against Return To Statute Labor For Road Work

The entire 1936 Council was returned by the electors of the Township on Monday in one of the most interesting elections in years, and shows in a manner that the majority of the voters were satisfied with the manner in which the township affairs were conducted the past two years under the leadership of the Reeve, John Lockhart, Mr. Lockhart had a majority of 165 over Wm. Heitman and 232 over L. O. Moore, his other opponent.

Jas. Fawcett, the youngest member of the Council, again was returned at the head of the poll with a vote of 414, duplicating his performance of 1935, while Mr. Morton Sayers was a close second with 401. George McDonald, the third member had a close race with Jos. McCutcheon whom he defeated by one vote, 373 to 372. There is a probability that there may be a recount demanded when the vote is so close, but at the time of going to press this matter has not been decided.

## Margaret Meggitt Taken To Hospital For Sick Children For Treatment

Margaret, seven year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Meggitt was terribly burned about the body late Sunday afternoon, when her dress caught fire while she was close to the stove at her home east of Flesherton. The little girl was watching a pan of meat cooking on the stove and it is thought that her dress caught fire by coming in contact with the hot stove. In a moment flames enveloped her and she ran screaming to the barn where her mother was feeding the chickens. The high wind fanned the flames and practically all the clothing was burned from her body. Her parents gave first aid treatment and Dr. Milne of Flesherton was hurriedly called to relieve the little girl's sufferings. Her face, arms and body received terrible burns and her condition is critical. Tuesday morning she was taken by Dr. Milne to the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto.

Margaret has been attending Flesherton public school for the past year. A report of Margaret's condition during Tuesday evening had not been received up to the time of going to press, but Dr. Milne informs us that very little hope is held out for her recovery as there was a great area of her body that was burned.
