Operated On Boy On Sewing Machine

Orangeville, Jan. 5—A two-year-old boy, son of Angus Cole, recovered in his farm home in Mono Township today after undergoing a difficult mastoid operation in the kitchen of the house last night.

Dr. S. T. White, who performed the operation with the assistance of Dr. C. I. Scott and Dr. J. W. Leach, was unable to remove the child patient to hospital here because it has no isolation facilities and the boy was suffering from scarlet fever.

A sewing-machine top served as the operating-table and a neighborhood garageman set up an automobile light in the little room for the convenience of the surgeons.

The operation went off without a hitch and the child's condition became better a few hours after.
