GLENELG'S REEVE IS WARDEN OF GREY

Angus A. MacArthur is the Choice of County Council on Tuesday

Mr. Angus A. MacArthur, Reeve of Glenelg, was chosen by the members of Grey County Council as Warden for 1937 when they met at the Court House in Owen Sound on Tuesday evening. Eight were nominated for the position but all withdrew excepting Mr. MacArthur and Mr. W. H. Hunter of Egremont. When the vote was taken Mr. MacArthur had 26 supporters to his opponent's 11, and on motion of Mr. Hunter the choice was made unanimous. The Standard congratulates the new Warden on being chosen for the position. We feel sure he will fill the office with credit to himself and profit to the County.

The new Warden was born in Glenelg township on the farm where he has always resided. He is married and has four sons and three daughters. In his first attempt at gaining municipal office he was successful in being elected Reeve of his native township three years ago. Since that time he has shown marked ability and being chosen as Warden is an evidence that his fellow-councillors have appreciated his capabilities. It is 43 years since Glenelg was thus honored when the late George Binnie was chosen.

Others nominated were Reeve Austin Ball of Hanover, Reeve David Allen of Shallow Lake, Reeve Allan Wilkinson of Sydenham, Reeve Louis Himmler of Neustadt, Reeve Howard McCauley of Flesherton and Reeve John A. Davis of Artemesia.

Walter McCullough Died at Collingwood

A respected resident of the town, R. Walter McCullough, died at his home on Hume street at 1.30 o'clock on Monday. Early in December Mr. McCullough was seized with a heart attack, complicated with bronchial pneumonia, but had appeared well on the way to recovery. On Sunday he suffered a relapse and the end on Monday was sudden.

The deceased was well-known throughout the district, his business of blacksmithing at the rear of the Arlington Hotel bringing him in contact with the farmers for miles around. He was born sixty-eight years ago in Euphrasia township, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert McCullough. There he learned the trade of blacksmith, and conducted a business at Rocklyn until 1917, when the family moved into Collingwood, taking up residence at the corner of Hume and St. Marie Sts.

Thirty-eight years ago Mr. McCullough was married to Sarah Jane Yeadell, who with three daughters, survives. The family are Ethel, Mrs. William Clarke, Detroit; Vera, Mrs. M. C. Tymon, at home, and Iva, Mrs. J. R. Flynn, Toronto. There is one grandchild, and three sisters and three brothers. They are Mrs. George Moore, Meaford; Mrs. James Breadner, Mrs. Ed. Fothergill, near Markdale; John, Carman, Man.; Alfred, Dundalk; William in Gait. One brother, Fred, died at Rocklyn a few years ago.

Mr. McCullough was a member of the Blacksmiths and Woodworkers' Association. He attended Presbyterian Church.

She was the last of the Nixon family to pass away.

She is survived by three sons and two daughters, namely: Thomas on the homestead; Wilmer at Harkaway; Albert at Riverdale; Mrs. Cochrane McCauley of Berkeley and Mrs. John H. Menary of Harkaway. Two daughters and one son passed away when quite young and Mrs. Merrill McCauley, another daughter, died about 17 years ago.

Following an illness of a little more than two weeks, the death occurred at the hospital here at a late hour on Sunday night of Mr. George Haves. He had been under treatment for a complication of diseases and his death was not unexpected.

The late Mr. Haves, who was in his 79th year, was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Haves, and was born at Eye, Suffolk, England. The family came to Canada 62 years ago and settled in Amaranth township where they lived until 1884 when they moved to St. Mary's, remaining there on a farm until 1918 when he retired and came to Markdale to make his home with his sister, Mrs. Henry Wells.
