

Restricted Area Campaign

Throughout Grey County the greatest interest is being taken in the Restricted Area Campaign now being carried on. Approximately one half of the county has been covered the first time. Exceptionally large meetings were held at Vandeleur, Carleton Place, Ravenna, Meaford, Bogart, Mount Pleasant School, Owen Sound, Killbuck, Annan, Desboro and Durham. Not quite so many were present at Wolsley and Allan Park. They varied from 42 to 86.

The chief objections offered were:
1. That farmers would lose many cattle which might make it difficult.

Such objection is without foundation, because the farmers will get sufficient to replenish their herds, because the compensation received and the sale of the animal will recoup the loss.

Moreover, it is not expected the total losses will amount to more than 3 to 5% in Grey County. Farmers have this Restricted Policy in 14 counties now and none have as yet been put off their farms.

2. Difficult and expensive clean-up required.

Such again is foundationless. Farmers can do all the work of scraping and whitewashing themselves. They need not have one cent of outlay except for lime and a little disinfectant.

Moreover, not all stables must be cleaned. If a farmer has no reactors he need not clean unless he likes. In Northumberland, where slightly over 4% of cattle were diseased, 3606 herds were tested. Diseased animals were found in only 241 herds or 15 stables out of every 100 had to be cleaned.

PROGRESS OF CAMPAIGN

Although only a week has elapsed since the work was started, there has come to the Grey County Department of Agriculture office at Markdale two completed petitions, from S.S. No. 12, Sydenham, and S.S. No. 11, Artemesia. The former is signed 100% in favour. This is the first 100% petition to be received with all in favour. The latter has 19 names in favour and only 3 opposed or 93%. This was the first petition to be received. Who will be next? Messrs. G. F. MacDonald and Robert King handled the first petition in Sydenham and Messrs. C. Boland and Councillor E. Warling called in the farmers in S.S. No. 11, Artemesia. The Sydenham campaign is under the direction of Messrs. Geo. Bothwell, Ex-Reeve of Sydenham, and Councillor C. Lipssett, Balaclava. They surely are to be congratulated. Meetings this week are being held in Normanby, Egrement, Glenelg, Osprey, Artemesia, Euphrasia and Holland Townships. Farmers will find these meetings advertised in all local papers serving those townships. Mr. R. H. Graham, Live Stock Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, is the special speaker. He has been through many of the counties that have the restricted area in operation. T. Stewart Cooper is present at all meetings also.
