Financial reports of the various organizations showed everything in satisfactory condition, and the Church Treasurer's Report showed all expenses met. St. Matthias' Church, Berkeley

The Annual Meeting of the Vestry was held in the Church on Wednesday afternoon, January 20th. Financial Reports showed a better standing than last year, testifying to the work of the officers and to the loyal support of the congregation. The Diocesan Budget was met in full in response to the urgent appeal of the Diocese. The Rector expressed his hearty appreciation of all efforts put forth and of all organizations and workers and of the Wardens and Vestry Clerk.

Some preliminary discussion of efforts to be put forth in this Fiftieth Anniversary year of St. Matthias' Church took place, definite decisions to be reached later. An Anniversary Service is likely to be held in the early summer.

To conform with the policy of the Diocese as expressed in a circular letter received by the Clergy from the Bishop recently, that Canon XX be complied with by every congregation and to help meet the exigencies of this Jubilee Year of St. Matthias' Church, the first Select Vestry of this Church was elected, being made up of the following members: Church Wardens, Vestry Clerk ex-officio, together with Messrs. J. McLaughlin, J. Sowerby, H. Gillespie, Wm. Wright, G. McKennitt and Wm. Sowerby, and Mrs. A. Hannah and Mrs. Ed. Beatty. The Select Vestry holds office for one year, or until another election takes place.

Any member of the congregation happening to have any old minute book of Vestry Meetings after 1893, or any record of the Services held in the Orange Hall previous to 1883 and in the Church previous to 1890; also any record of Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials previous to 1890 will be of great help to the Church if they will submit same to the Rector. These records are of priceless value, and have a distinct present use in the compilation of a History of St. Matthias' Church now being undertaken. In fact any record whatsoever which is pertinent to the work of the Church in early days may come in useful. Already much very valuable material has been secured.

Mrs. Robert Wyllie Laid to Rest in Owen Sound

Old friends and neighbours, representatives of pioneer families of the city, Church and other associates filled the Breckenridge Undertaking Parlours, Owen Sound, to capacity on Friday afternoon when last rites were observed for Mrs. Robert Wyllie, native and almost lifelong resident of Owen Sound, whose sudden death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. D. Mercer, in Markdale on Wednesday morning of last week. According to plans she was to have left in a few days to spend the remainder of the winter with her daughter, Mrs. Perkins, and Rev. I. G. Perkins at Sault Ste. Marie. Her sudden passing, coming in the midst of activities shared with her family and friends, intensified the sorrow of the loss.

The deceased was a native of Owen Sound, her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John Tucker being among the pioneers of that town. They came from England and Mr. Tucker was one of the first business men in Owen Sound. Her marriage to Robert Wyllie united two of the city's earliest families. Mrs. Wyllie spent all her married life there, and since the death of her husband in 1916 she had made Owen Sound her headquarters, but spent considerable time visiting her daughters.

Rev. Gordon Domm, minister of Knox United Church, in delivering the funeral message, spoke in deep tribute of the home which the deceased and her husband had established in Owen Sound and maintained for many years, the ideal life which they had shared and the things of moral and spiritual worth which they had given to their family. Such things, he brought out in words of comfort to the sorrowing children, transcend death and parting. He referred also with deep appreciation to the interest which the deceased had always maintained in Knox United Church. Mr. Domm read scriptural passages rich in promise of immortality.

Many beautiful tributes of flowers marked the last rites, received from neighbours and old friends, who shared the loss sustained by the relatives of the deceased. The pallbearers were all close relatives of her family: two sons-in-law, Mr. W. D. Mercer and Mr. Harold McInnis of Markdale; a grandson, Mr. Hugh Mercer of Kitchener; two nephews, Mr. Allen Leslie of Toronto and Mr. J. P. Leslie of Owen Sound, and a nephew-in-law, Mr. C. L. Van Wyck.

Members of the family in attendance included Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Mercer and Mr. and Mrs. H. McInnis of Markdale; Mr. Hugh Mercer of Kitchener; Miss Helen Mercer of Toronto; Mrs. I. G. Perkins of Sault Ste. Marie. Her son, Mr. George Wyllie, of Stettler, Alberta, was unable to be present.

Interment was made at Greenwood Cemetery in Owen Sound.
