## Live Stock Market Report

Although the supply of cattle over the week-end was considerably less than the previous week, the market opened slow on Monday, due to the fact that the local trade in dressed meats has been confined, on account of a similar condition in the retail trade. Export shipments to the United States are limited, as the price margin is very narrow and really not very helpful at the present time.  
Choice heavy steers sold at from 6.50 to 7.00; fair to good from 5.75 to 6.40; common and medium 5.00 to 5.60. In the butcher section, the trade was slow and only a few of the prime steers and heifers sold around 5.50; fair to good butchers brought from 5.00 to 5.40; common and medium 4.25 to 4.90. All classes of cows held steady, some of the best bringing from 3.75 to 4.00; fair to good 3.25 to 3.65; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00. The bull trade was slow, choice light butcher bulls from 4.00 to 4.50; choice heavy bulls 3.50 to 3.85; bolognas from 3.50 to 3.75.  
In the small meats, the lamb market was easier, choice lambs selling at 10.00, with a few extra choice at slightly higher prices. Best sheep brought from 5.00 to 5.50, others lower according to quality. The calf trade was easier, choice from 10.50 to 11.00; fair to good from 9.00 to 10.00; common and medium 6.00 to 8.00.  
The hog market recovered some of the decline on Monday and sales were made at \$75 for truck deliveries. It will depend entirely upon supplies for the balance of the week, as to what will take place.

Holland, January 11th, 1937

The members-elect met on the above date and each having taken the necessary declaration the Council was organized: Reeve, John Heighes; Deputy-Reeve, G. Hanna; Councillors, R. Dixon, H. Gillespie and R. McFadden.  
The minutes of December meeting were read and confirmed.  
Accounts were then read: For relief, \$29.36; The Markdale Standard, printing and supplies, \$185.00; Election expenses, \$75.50.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That Geo. Hanna be Chairman of the Finance Committee for 1937.—Carried.  
Gillespie - Dixon—That the Road Commissioners for 1937 be: No. 1, Russell Dixon; No. 2, John Heighes; No. 3, Harold Gillespie; No. 4, Robt. McFadden; No. 5, Geo. Hanna.—Carried.  
Dixon - Hanna—That the Treasurer's vouchers for 1934 and 1935 be placed in the vault for safe keeping.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That the minutes of each meeting be published in The Markdale Standard and Sun-Times.—Carried.  
McFadden - Dixon—That the Road Superintendent's statement for 1936 be passed and the Reeve, Treasurer and Clerk be authorized to sign the same and send it to the Department of Highways asking subsidy of the same.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That the bill from Oliver's Funeral Service be held over till next meeting for further information.—Cd.  
McFadden - Gillespie—That the Clerk order ten copies of The Municipal World for the Council and its officials.—Carried.  
Gillespie - Dixon—That the Fenceviewers for 1937 be: Joseph Matthews, Jas. Hammill, Frank Angus, Wm. Shea and Donald Cook.—Carried.  
Hanna - Dixon—That the following be Pound-keepers for 1937: W. J. McKessock, Wilmot Clark, D. J. Bradley, Emerson Craven, W. Beirnes and Fred. Moore.—Carried.  
Dixon - Hanna—That the Sheep Valuers for 1937 be: Wm. Rice, John Norton, Geo. McNeely, Wm. Erwin and Chris. Routenburg.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That Wm. J. Wright be Weed Inspector for 1937.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That we appoint John Armstrong member of the Board of Health for 1937.—Carried.  
Hanna - Dixon—That Peter Telford give no tile out for Township purposes without an order from the Council or the Road Superintendent.—Carried.  
Gillespie - Dixon—That the Council take no action regarding the account of Mrs. A. Woyce re Hawken family.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That the Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and Treasurer be the Relief Committee for 1937.—Carried.  
Hanna - Dixon—That the Reeve be Chairman of the Relief Committee at a salary of \$10.00 per year.—Carried.  
Dixon - McFadden—That Victor Wales and A. Elliott be Auditors for 1937 at a salary of \$20.00 each, they to make a complete audit of all books in connection with the Township.—Carried.  
Dixon - Hanna—That John A. Kirk be re-engaged as Assessor for the year 1937 for the sum of \$100.00.—Carried.  
Hanna - Dixon—That there be no refund of dog tax after the Court of Revision unless owing to error on roll.—Carried.  
Gillespie - Hanna—That John Dixon be Sanitary Inspector for 1937 at a fee of \$1.00 for placarding, \$2.00 for disinfection and 10 cents per mile one way.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That we notify the Clerk to get all forms necessary for Pound-keepers, Fenceviewers, Sheep Valuers and to see they are fully supplied with same.—Carried.  
McFadden - Gillespie—That By-Law for road expenditures for 1937 be held over till next meeting.—Carried.  
Dixon - Hanna—That A. Gillespie and D. McLaughlin be Truant Officers for 1937.—Carried.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That leave be granted to introduce a By-Law to borrow money for Township purposes for 1937.—Carried.  
Leave granted. By-Law introduced and numbered 1, and read a first time.  
Dixon - Hanna—That By-Law No. 1 be now read a second time.—Carried.  
By-Law No. 1 was read a second time accordingly.  
Gillespie - Dixon—That By-Law No. 1 be now read a third time signed by the Reeve and Clerk and engrossed in the By-Law book.—Carried.  
Gillespie - Hanna—That this Council refund John Dixon \$2.90, owing to error in assessment.—Carried.  
Mr. Hanna presented Report No. 1 of Finance Committee, recommending payment of \$451.14.  
Gillespie - McFadden—That Report No. 1 of Finance Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.  
Council then adjourned until Tuesday, Feb. 2nd, at one o'clock p.m.
