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Dundalk Won in Over-Time Friday Night

In a Centre Grey Hockey League game at Dundalk on Friday evening last the home team won from the Markdale outfit in overtime by a score of 5 to 3. It was a great game and the spectators sure got full value for their two-bits paid for admission fee. Markdale boys were without the assistance of their star defence man, Bev. Johnston, but they put up a real battle against the unbeaten Dundalk squad, who were at full strength. R. Boyd of Flesherton was in charge and he handled the game well. No favors were shown and all were well pleased with his work.

Dundalk got their first counter early in the opening period when their steller defenceman, Baechler, carried the puck down the ice, passed to Copeland just outside the blue line and went on in to take the pass from Copeland. He scored on a nice shot. Dundalk's second goal was notched on a long shot which struck Dundas' stick and rolled into the net. Markdale boys were pressing hard all the time and finally York, Hartley and Noble went over the blue line with the puck well under control and Noble netted a nice one on a pass from York. The period ended 2-1 in favor of Dundalk. Markdale got two penalties in this period.

In the second frame Dundalk secured another counter when Frank McGuirk beat Goalie Dundas with a nice shot from close in. On another of Markdale's effective rushes Noble gave the puck to York who scored to make the count 2-3 at the end of the second. Both teams were given penalties in this frame.

In the final spasm Noble scored again when the three forwards invaded the Dundalk territory. It was a three-man play with York finally giving the disc to Noble. The regular playing time ended with the score 3-3.

In the extra ten minutes of play the Proton Station lads, playing for Dundalk, netted a goal each and made the final count 5-3.

Markdale boys under the capable coaching of Jimmie Noble have made wonderful progress and came close to beating the unbeaten stalwarts playing for Dundalk.

Hunt and Macauley soon found the range and York evened the count. McGuirk opened the second period with another display of speed that brought the score to 2-2 for Dundalk. As the third period opened York tied the count for the second time on a pass from D. Hunt. McGuirk got away again and was around the defense for his third goal but the lead faded as Borinsky rushed from the defense to take a pass from D. Hunt for the final counter of the regular period.

The overtime started fast with two and three-men rushes which netted Dundalk their fifth goal, by Copeland, after three minutes of play. Both teams began to show signs of the pace and rushes lost their threat. Markdale resorted to long lifts and, just as the gong sounded, a long one from M. Burnside at his own blue line dropped from the upper air and deflected off Sims' glove into the net. Final score: Dundalk 5, Markdale 5.

Glenelg Pioneer Minister Buried at Rockwood

From one of our exchanges we clip the following item reporting the funeral of the late Rev. John Little, who some years ago was a resident of this locality. At one time he preached every second Sunday evening in a little Church which was located near Townsend Lake in Glenelg township.

The following beautiful tribute to his memory comes from Rev. Wylie C. Clark of Amherst, Nova Scotia: "He had a great and useful life. Many found light and hope under his preaching. His congregations heard him gladly and never had to go away without obtaining help to live and meet the daily needs of life. He was a friend to saint and sinner and well did he know how to meet and treat them all. His rare gift of good-will was an open door through which strangers as well as friends could always come and be sure of a welcome which warmed their hearts and helped to cleanse their souls. Many will miss him but there is no grief in his going, rather a joyous victory of a great and good soul going home."

Following is the item which tells of the funeral:

The funeral of the late Rev. John Little was held on Monday, Jan. 4, at Rockwood, Ont. A short service at the home was conducted by Rev. W. J. Taylor, assisted by Rev. M. F. Stewart of Bellwood, and was followed by a public service in the United Church in charge of Rev. W. J. Taylor, chairman of the Guelph Presbytery.

Several ministerial friends of the deceased took part. Rev. C. C. McDonald of Galt read the Scripture lessons; Rev. Norman McKenzie of Ripley offered prayer; Rev. J. W. Hunt of Hespeler, and Rev. W. J. Gallagher of Guelph gave brief addresses.

The former paid a fine personal tribute to the late Mr. Little as one who had been a guiding and inspirational influence in his life; the latter also paid great tribute to the late Mr. Little, summarizing his remarks in the brief statement, "He was a good man and a faithful minister." Favorite hymns of Mr. Little were used in the service: "Breathe on Me Breath of God" and "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me," also two special numbers were sung, "O Love that will not let me go," by Mr. H. Lamb of Detroit, and "Good Night" by the Church male quartette.

Beautiful floral tributes from the family, the United Church Session, Stone Church, Eramosa, Barrie Hill, Carthage United Church and many friends, represented deep affection and loyalty to the memory of their spiritual leader. They were carried by five nephews, Walter Amos, Toronto, James Bradshaw, Conn. Will Little, Guelph, John P. Little, Puslinch, and Lindsay McFarlane, Puslinch.

The pallbearers were the elders of the United Church Session, Messrs. George Gordon, C. H. Harris, H. S. Hosking, John Graham, Robert Moore, Colin Kitching and G. H. Pearen.

Honorary pallbearers included elders and members from his former congregations: Dr. J. L. Smith of Durham; John Putherbough and Donald Ferguson of London; Geo. Francis, Mount Forest; Robt. The service at the grave was also in charge of his pastor assisted by the Rev. G. H. Thomas of Kitchener, secretary of Guelph Presbytery, and Rev. C. F. Logan of Kitchener.

Interment was made in the Rockwood Cemetery beside his beloved wife, who predeceased him six years ago.
