Markdale Ladies' Hockey Club reached the first of their objectives Saturday night when they successfully triumphed over the Stayner girls to the tune of 5 - 2.

Due to road conditions and lack of transportation the Toronto Pals were unable to make connections and Stayner girls, showing real sportsmanship, filled the breach.

After a fast start the combination work of the local girls got results on a sparkling passing play, the line of the Cuttings girls and Helen Carefoot netting the puck. A few minutes later the same line again counted.

The second period was fast, exciting hockey with the passing and checking of the town girls being of real hockey calibre. Both teams counted twice in this period although one of the Stayner goals was a gift.

The final period was rather slow and draggy with the local girls protecting the lead after a slight injury to their starry centre, Devona Cutting. Helen Carefoot netted the final goal on a pretty piece of stick handling. Although the line of the Cutting girls and Helen Carefoot were responsible for all the goals, Ruth Alton, Mary Bradey and Revena Green showed real ability, improvement in stick handling and excelled in back checking. The defence of Betty Carefoot and Mavis Thompson were steady and covered up well. The work of Verdun Kidd in goal was outstanding and real credit goes to this girl who has only donned the pads the last couple of weeks.

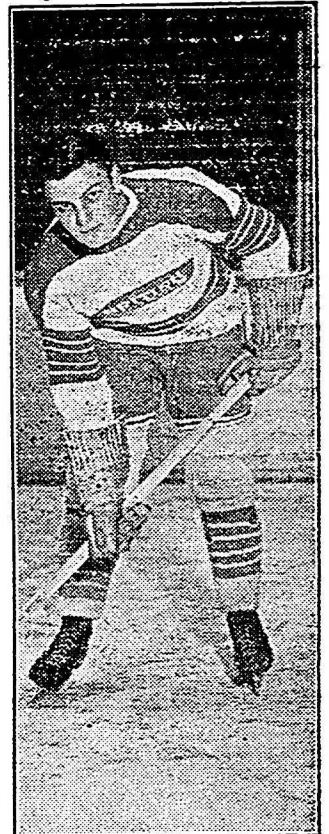
