Live Stock Market Report

Supplies of cattle were considerably curtailed this week and prices held steady. Trading was slow at times, as the outlet seemed limited, in spite of the moderate receipts. The first shipment of cattle to go overseas this year, was made up of two car-loads of feeders and one car-load of bulls, which were bought on the local market.

Choice heavy steers were in good demand at from 6.50 to 7.00; fair to good from 5.75 to 6.40. Choice butcher steers brought from 5.50 to 6.00; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.40; common and medium 4.00 to 4.50. Stockers and feeders were in light supply and those of selected quality brought from 4.00 to 4.50, with short keep feeders at 5.00. The cow trade was stronger, choice fat cows selling at from 4.00 to 4.25; fair to good from 3.25 to 3.75; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 1.75 to 2.40. Choice milch cows and springers were in strong demand at from \$50.00 to \$65.00 each. The bull trade was slow, choice heavy bulls selling from 3.50 to 4.00, while bolognas made from 2.50 to 3.75.

Western lamb shipments brought 9.75, while local Ontario lambs brought from 9.00 to 9.50. Heavy lambs were discounted \$1.00. All classes of sheep held steady, choice from 5.60 to 5.50. The calf trade was easier, choice veals bringing from 10.00 to 10.50; fair to good 6.00 to 10.00; common and medium 6.00 to 8.00.

The hog market was slow, but prices held steady, sales being made on the basis of from 8.25 to 8.40 on Monday for truck deliveries, with the prospect of a steady trade for the balance of the week.
