Another week of favourable progress has concluded. Up until Saturday the following declarations have been received—

Petitions from Dundalk, Markdale and Flesherton show 100%, although declarations at time of writing have not been made. Artemesia, Collingwood, Euphrasia, Egremont and Holland are now ready, but because of Short Course work at Kemble, have been unable to secure declarations. One school section in Glenelg, Bentinck and Proton and two in Normanby remain to send in their petitions. This will complete the county.
