Live Stock Market Report

Supplies of cattle were very light for Monday's market and prices held steady on cattle of good to choice quality, while other classes were slow and easier. The cow trade was active and strong. The choice heavy steers brought from 7.00 to 7.35, with the bulk of the good to choice selling from 6.50 to 7.00; fair to good from 5.50 to 6.25. In the butcher section, choice steers and heifers brought from 5.25 to 5.50; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.25; common and medium 4.00 to 4.50. Choice baby calves sold at from 7.00 to 8.00; others at lower prices according to quality. Choice fat cows were in strong demand at from 4.00 to 4.25; fair to good 3.50 to 3.90; common and medium 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters 1.75 to 2.50. The bull trade was slow, choice heavy bulls making from 3.50 to 2.75, with an odd top of 4.00. Bolognas 3.50 to 3.75.

The lamb market was somewhat lower, top sales being made at 9.50 on Monday. Choice light sheep brought from 5.00 to 5.50. The calf market was easier, because of a very limited demand for export. Choice calves brought from 9.75 to 10.00; fair to good from 8.75 to 9.50; common and medium 5.50 to 8.00.

The hog market was disappointing as prices were considerably lower on Monday, sales being made on the basis of from \$0.00 to \$1.00 for truck deliveries, with a dull outlook for the balance of the week.
