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## THE BATTLE OF THE BALLOTS IS BEING WAGED IN EARNEST

### Big List of Candidates From Each Municipality Indicates Wide Interest in Contest

FILL UP YOUR BALLOT EACH WEEK AND SEND THEM IN—YOUR OPINION IS AS GOOD AS THE OTHER FELLOWS—VOTE EARLY AND OFTEN.

There is much difference of opinion as to who the two best known men in each municipality named are. Up to date no less than 123 men have been named and still the ballots continue to arrive at The Standard office.

We would like all of our readers to join in this contest. The more complete the vote, the better it will give the combined opinion of our readers as to who are the 2 men best known throughout Grey County and residing in each of the municipalities named. When filling in your ballot try to pick the two men from each municipality you think are likely known to the largest number of people in the county, not necessarily in your own neighborhood. Former residents should not be named.

Send in a ballot each week or get your neighbor to send one in. The more we get the better the contest. No person is confined to any number of ballots.

A ballot with fourteen blanks, two for each municipality, with spaces for the voter's name and address, etc., will be found elsewhere in this paper. Each ballot must contain two names from each of the municipalities or it will not be counted.

When the votes are all in the result will be tabulated and the two men from each municipality receiving the most votes will be named as being the best known. No ballot will be counted which does not include two men from each of the municipalities named. The names from each municipality will be placed in order of the number of votes received—that is the man receiving the most votes will be No. 1 and so on.

A prize of \$3 will be given the reader who first sends in a ballot with the correct final list as shown by the complete vote (or the nearest to the correct final list), with their names in the proper order. A prize of \$2 will go to the reader whose ballot comes second in order of date and correctness. And a prize of \$1 will go to the person whose ballot comes third in order of date and correctness.

If the winner of the first prize is a subscriber whose subscription is paid in advance to Dec. 31, 1937, or further, the prize money will be \$6 instead of \$3. And if, in addition they have sent in during the contest a bona-fide new subscription paid in advance for one year or more, the prize money will be \$9.

The same rule will apply to the second and third prizes. That is, the second prize, may be \$4 or \$6, instead of \$2, if the foregoing requirements have been met. And, likewise, the third prize may be \$2 or \$3 instead of \$1.

So that ample time may be given for the vote, the ballot will appear in each issue up to and including that under date of April 29th.

You are not held down to sending in one ballot. You may send in as many as you wish. If you desire to change some of the names, or change the order of the names, this affords an opportunity to do so. The names as submitted to date follow:—

## James Welsh Passed at Peterborough

A former highly esteemed pioneer resident of this locality in the person of James Welsh passed away at the home of his son in Peterborough on Wednesday, March 10th, following but a few days' illness from pneumonia. He had been about as usual and enjoyed good health up to the last.

The deceased was born in Ireland in 1850 and came to Canada in 1856 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Welsh. The family settled in Holland, near Berkeley, where in 1862 Mr. Welsh married Mary Jane Bateman, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Bateman, who passed away in Markdale in September, 1926. After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Welsh farmed in Holland until 1907 when they moved to Markdale. After the death of his wife Mr. Welsh went to Peterborough to reside with his son.

Surviving are three sons: Robert B. in Toronto; Harold A. in Peace River, Alberta, and James L. in Peterborough. A sister, Mrs. S. Smith of Toronto, also survives.

Following a service in Peterborough on Thursday evening the remains were conveyed to Markdale and the funeral took place Friday afternoon from the Oliver Funeral Parlours to Markdale Cemetery. The service at Peterborough was in charge of Rev. E. Rowland, pastor of Mark Street United Church. Rev. H. S. Warren was in charge of the service here. The pallbearers were Messrs. T. H. Wilson, Thos. Tuck, J. J. Richardson, John Hannah, H. Freeman and A. E. Colgan. Many floral tributes were placed on the casket and these were carried by old friends of the deceased.

Robert B. of Toronto and James L. of Peterborough were present at the funeral as well as relatives from Toronto, Hanover, Exeter and other points.

The late James Welsh was highly esteemed in this neighbourhood where he was active for a great many years. He was for many years a member of L.O.L. No. 1045, Markdale, and of Annesley United Church.

## John Henry Scilley Died at Dundalk Monday

John H. Scilley, a former resident of Markdale and a brother of Mrs. H. M. Irwin of this place, died at his home in Dundalk about nine o'clock on Monday morning, following an extended illness from pneumonia. He was a son of the late Enoch Scilley of Osprey where he was born a little more than 46 years ago.
