Relative of Euphrasia People Died at Alliston

The following, clipped from the Alliston Herald, refers to a nephew of the late Mrs. Robert Mathers of Euphrasia, where many relatives still reside:

Alliston and surrounding townships lost a well known citizen in the person of John Dunn who passed away after a comparatively short illness in the Western hospital, Toronto, on Saturday morning, the 27th ult., in his 71st year. Last October his sturdy physique and rugged constitution seemed to show signs of weakening and while he appeared to recover partially, yet the improvement was only temporary. He spent a short while in the Stevenson Memorial hospital and was then taken to Toronto where x-ray revealed a serious condition that necessitated a major surgical operation after which he lived only a few days. The late John Dunn was the son of Jas. Dunn and Elizabeth Ann Flynn, both of Irish stock. He was born on December 25th, 1866. The greater part of his life before he came to Alliston was spent in and around Baxter. He was married to Mary Louise Erwin on December 26th, 1894. In 1905 he suffered an accident which nearly cost him his life and by which he lost his left arm, incapacitating him for strenuous physical labor. Shortly after this he entered the insurance field and became representative of the Gore Insurance Company and the De Laval Separator. His business grew and in 1910 he moved into Alliston opening an office and in the years following built up a very profitable and successful business. During his years in town he served as a member of council in 1918 and 1919 and 1921 to 1924. All his life he was closely associated with the Church and was a member of the board of management of Knox church and chairman of the board since 1930. He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, joining that order on February 15th, 1912. He was also a charter member of the Cavell Rebekah Lodge. The funeral service of the Odd Fellows was read at the house and at the mortuary chapel with about 30 members in attendance. The funeral service was held from his late home on Queen street on Monday, March 1st, and was conducted by Rev. W. M. Lee, assisted by Rev. D. A. MacKeracher and Rev. G. C. Little. A great number of people called to pay their last respects to one who had been a familiar figure around town for over a quarter of a century. The cortege was one of the largest witnessed in town for some time. He leaves to mourn his loss, his wife, Mary Louise Erwin, and a family of two sons and two daughters: H. Elwood, Edna, (Mrs. Jos. Irwin) Louise (Mrs. Matt Campbell) and Albert. A sister, Mrs. Ruddle of Toronto, and a brother Sam of Chicago, also remain. The pall bearers were George Dunn, David Dunn, Herbert Dunn, J. H. Mitchell, James Rose and R. A. C. MacLean. There was a profusion of flowers banked around the casket testifying to the wide friendship enjoyed by the deceased. LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT
by DUNN & LEVACK, TORONTO

Only about half the number of cattle arrived for Monday's market, compared to a week ago and although early trading was slow, the market became active and prices fully steady.

Choice heavy steers brought from 7.50 to 8.00; fair to good from 6.75 to 7.25; common to medium 5.75 to 6.50. Choice handy weight butcher steers and heifers sold readily at from 5.75 to 6.25; fair to good from 5.25 to 5.75; common and medium 4.50 to 5.00. Choice baby heaves were in good demand at from 7.50 to 8.00, others at lower prices according to quality. The cow trade held steady, choice from 4.50 to 5.00; fair to good from 3.50 to 4.25; common to medium 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. All classes of bulls were in good demand at steady prices.

Western feed lot lambs made up the larger part of the run and choice lambs sold at 10c, with those of medium to good quality at slightly lower prices. Choice sheep made from 5.00 to 5.50. The calf market opened active and strong under a good demand for export shipments to the United States. Choice calves brought from 9.50 to 10.00; fair to good 8.00 to 9.25; common to medium 5.90 to 7.00.

Monday's hog market was active and strong, sales being made at higher prices, ranging from 8.65 to 8.90 for truck deliveries. Prospects look favorable for the balance of the week.
