The Time for Voting is Growing Short

The Question to Answer: "What Two Men Residing in Artemesia, Chatsworth, Euphrasia, Flesherton, Glenelg, Holland, Markdale Are Best Known by Residents of Grey County?"

There is a great difference of opinion among our readers as to the proper answer to the question as quoted above. Grey County covers a large territory and is composed of sixteen townships, four towns and six villages. A resident of any one of the municipalities must necessarily have stepped out a bit in order to be well known throughout such a wide area. To be well known in Toronto, Owen Sound or other centres of the province outside the county of Grey has no bearing on the matter. The County of Grey is the only territory to be considered.

Died Result of Injuries When Hit by Car

Charles Montgomery, well known Dundalk stock buyer and drover, passed away at 5 o'clock on Tuesday morning in Lord Dufferin Hospital, Orangeville, as the result of an accident on Provincial Highway No. 10, about 7 p.m. on Friday evening.

Deceased was a passenger in his own car, which was being driven by Mr. Ed. Seeley of Maxwell, and in which Mr. Montgomery's brother, Mr. Allan Montgomery, was also a passenger. There was a bad snowstorm at the time and a mile and a half south of Holland Centre the car left the road and went into the ditch. According to information supplied Provincial Constable Harry Noble, who investigated the accident, Mr. Charles Montgomery climbed out of the car and proceeded to flag a car driven by Mr. Albert Colgan of Flesherton. Deceased is said to have run into the side of this car, receiving severe injuries to his ribs. Mr. Colgan's car went into the ditch after the accident, but none of the occupants were seriously hurt.

Following the accident Mr. Montgomery was taken to Mr. Seeley's home, but on Saturday was moved to Orangeville Hospital, where his death occurred on Tuesday morning.

The late Mr. Montgomery was 51 years of age. He was a native of Proton and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Montgomery. Deceased was unmarried, but leaves to mourn his passing two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Stillman of Toronto and Mrs. Wilfred Thompson of Durham, and one brother, Allan, of Dundalk. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon.

An inquest will be held into his death.

Arthur Robert Murdoch Died at Noranda

Arthur Robert Murdoch, son of the late Mr. A. T. Murdoch and Mrs. Murdoch, formerly of this place, died in Noranda, Quebec, on March 27th, in his 35th year. Interment took place at Caledonia on Wednesday, March 31st.

He was born and attended Public and High schools in Markdale. After leaving school he worked on various construction projects throughout the Dominion. In May, 1928, he married Jessie Hamilton of Caledonia, who with Jean, a daughter, 6 years of age, remain to mourn his loss. In March of this year Mr. Murdoch left for Noranda, Quebec, and enroute was stricken with pneumonia, which proved fatal. In addition to his wife and daughter, his mother, Mrs. M. Murdoch, and a brother, D. J. Murdoch, also survive.

William Edward Bradey Passed Away Monday

Following an illness of several weeks from heart trouble Mr. Wm. Edward Bradey, a highly esteemed resident of Euphrasia township, passed away on Monday at the home of his brother, Mr. Wesley Bradey, at Townsend Lake. He had spent some time in the hospital here and with his sister, Mrs. J. J. Richardson, before going to the home of his brother to spend a few days prior to returning to his own home. Owing to ill health he had decided to retire from farming and had arranged for an auction sale which will be held on Friday of this week at his old home in Euphrasia.

The deceased was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bradey of Euphrasia where he was born nearly 70 years ago. He was a successful farmer and a number of years ago married Miss Jennie Hall of Invermay, who passed away nearly seven years ago. There was no family.

During all his life he was a member of the Anglican Church and was an active worker in Christ Church, Markdale, where for several years he was one of the Warden's. For more than 50 years he was an active and consistent member of L.O.L. No. 1045, Markdale.

Surviving are two sisters and one brother, namely: Mrs. Thomas Irwin of Ceylon; Mrs. J. J. Richardson of Markdale, and Mr. Wesley Bradey in Glenelg. There are also three half sisters and one half brother: Mrs. Wilmer McCauley and Mrs. David McCauley of Holland; Mrs. Hugh Johnston of Euphrasia, and Mr. Chris. Bradey in Toronto.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon from the home of his sister, Mrs. J. J. Richardson, in the village. Following a short service at the house the remains were conveyed to Christ Church where the Rector, Rev. C. O. Pherrill, conducted service. In his address Mr. Pherrill paid tribute to the departed as a churchman and a citizen. The remains were then conveyed to the Markdale Cemetery where they were laid to rest beside his wife. The Orange burial service was read at the grave by the officers of L.O.L. No. 1045. The pallbearers were Messrs. Bert and Bradey Irwin, John Harvey, Kenneth Hill, W. B. Gregory and Walter Rolt.
