## Demonstration Woodlots in Grey County

Eight woodlot owners of Grey County have consented to their woodlots being designated demonstration woodlots. A forester from the Forestry Branch advises the owner on utilization, improvement cuttings, thinnings and planting if necessary.

The purpose of selecting woodlots adjacent to a road is to draw attention to woodlots that are being preserved and that have forestry principles applied to their management. A Demonstration Woodlot sign has been placed where it may be seen.

There are 15 acres of hardwood on the McLoughry farm south-east of Markdale. For years the fuelwood requirements for the house have been secured from the woods. Trees that show signs of deterioration due to age and crowding are selected for cutting. The large sound trees are cut if more fuelwood or logs for lumber are needed. The woodlot always has a well-kept appearance and there are no large openings made as in woodlots where all the trees on a small area are cut. The trees are healthy and there is a much higher annual growth of wood than in a woodlot that is cut clean, either as a whole or in small areas each year.

Mr. W. A. Weber intends to grow timber and fuelwood on a 50 acre rocky hillside one mile north of the hydro plant at Eugenia Falls. It is largely a second growth hardwood stand and it is being improved by thinnings. These thinnings yield a considerable quantity of fuelwood and increase the future value of the property. The sugar maple and white ash are left rather than the ironwood and beech as they are much more valuable timber.

There are several fine woodlots west of Walter's Falls. The one owned by Mr. S. E. Hammill, one mile west of Walter's Falls was quite open 8-10 years ago, but has thickened up very much since then, and to-day there is a fine stand of saplings that will take the place of any trees that may be cut in the future.

Mr. N. S. Laycock owns the hardwood bush on the north side of No. 26 Highway, 8 miles east of Owen Sound. This site is only suitable for growing trees as there is only a thin covering of soil on the flat limestone rock. There are thousands of acres of this type and stony land in Grey County. It would be advisable to keep most of these types forested, as they are usually poor pasture sites and they cannot be renewed by cultivation.

Mr. Albert Fleming is preserving 7 acres of woods on the county road between Tara and Owen Sound. Several open places were planted with pine and spruce. These will increase the value of the woodlot, as pine and spruce lumber is very useful for building and repairs. The appearance of a hardwood woods is improved if there are evergreens.

The fine second-growth hardwood bush 3 miles east of Chesley is owned by Mr. J. R. Reid. Fifteen cords of 16" wood has been cut annually for the past 30 years. A large percentage of this wood was secured by cutting the trees that were being crowded out, as a result of the natural thinning that takes place in a growing stand.

Master Eugene Foy, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Aylmer Foy of Berkeley, was admitted to the hospital suffering from a very severe attack of appendicitis. He made a good recovery and went home a few days ago.

Master Jack Dennison was operated upon for the removal of his tonsils and adenoids.

Masters Vernon McCauley and John Young came in to have their tonsils removed the beginning of this week.

Mr. Thos. Scott had the misfortune to have his leg fractured while in the woods. The leg was X-rayed at the hospital and the fracture reduced. He returned home, and is resting fairly well.

There were a great number of other X-rays taken and the hospital had another busy month.

Mr. Alex. Patterson has 150 acres of woodland. It is principally a sugar maple, beech woods with some basswood, elm, white ash, hemlock and ironwood. Fuelwood for three houses and a steam engine that supplies the power for threshing and grinding is cut each year. It is secured by cutting the dead and defective trees. A surplus is being grown and this may be drawn on for building, or money may be raised in an emergency by selling timber and fuelwood. It is in reality an insurance and it has an advantage over the ordinary insurance policy, that a premium does not have to be paid on a certain date.

There is a fine woodlot south of Hopeville in Proton. It is owned by Mr. Wm. McKinney. The previous owner planted an open corner with pine in 1928. They have grown well and to-day are 6-10 feet in height.

The Dierlamm farm in Normanby township north of Neustadt has 20 acres of woodland. This woodlot was injured severely by the frost in the extreme winter of 1933. There was a fine understory of trees 2-4 inches in diameter and about 30 feet in height. This understory was nearly 100% killed and it was a severe loss as the trees had reached the size when they were putting on an appreciable yearly growth and would take the place of any large trees that were cut. The dead trees are being cut and under-planting of pines and spruce is being done, as it is quite open underneath. Nature would reforest this area thickly in a few years, but the Dierlamm Brothers are taking advantage to plant pine and spruce, thus increasing the utility and appearance of the woods.

2 eggs

5 cents shredded cocoanut  
1 cup granulated sugar  
½ cup sweet cream  
2 teaspoonsful baking powder
