Demonstration Woodlots in Grey County

Eight woodlot owners of Grey County have consented to their woodlots being designated demonstration woodlots. A forester from the Forestry Branch advises the owner on utilization, improvement cuttings, thinnings and planting if time. necessary.

The purpose of selecting woodlots adjacent to a road is to draw attention to woodiots that are being preserved and that have forestry principles applied to their management. A Demonstration Woodlot sign has been placed where it may be seen. The following are the owners of
