**Last Ballot in Connection
With Contest Appears in
This Issue. Result Will be
Announced May 13th**

This is the last week in the Best Known Men Contest. A ballot appears on page six of this issue and this will be the last one. All ballots marked and returned to this office on or before 12 o'clock on Saturday night, May 5th, will be counted and the announcement as to the choice of the best known men will be made in our issue of May 13th. If you have not already sent in your ballots do so at once. The contest is proving interesting and the announcement will reveal some surprises to those taking part in the event. Vote early and often.

A prize of \$3 will be given the reader who first sends in a ballot with the correct final list as shown by the complete vote (or the nearest to the correct final list), with their names in the proper order. A prize of \$2 will go to the reader whose ballot comes second in order of date and correctness. And a prize of \$1 will go to the person whose ballot comes third in order of date and correctness.

It is the winner of the first prize is a subscriber whose subscription is paid in advance to December 31st, 1937, or further, the prize money will be \$6 instead of \$3. And if, in addition they have sent in during the contest a bona-fide new subscription paid in advance for one year or more, the prize money will be \$9.

The same rule will apply to the second and third prizes. That is, the second prize may be \$4 or \$6, instead of \$2, if the foregoing requirements have been met. And, likewise, the third prize may be \$2 or \$3 instead of \$1.

When the votes are all in the result will be tabulated and the two men from each municipality receiving the most votes will be named as being the best known. No ballot will be counted which does not include two men from each of the municipalities named. The names from each municipality will be placed in order of the number of votes received—that is the man receiving the most votes will be No. 1 and so on.

A ballot with fourteen blanks, two for each municipality, with spaces for the voter's name and address, etc., will be found elsewhere in this paper. Each ballot must contain two names from each of the municipalities or it will not be counted.

So that ample time may be given for the vote, the ballot will appear in each issue up to and including that under date of April 29th.

You are not held down to sending in one ballot. You may send in as many as you wish. If you desire to change some of the names, or change the order of the names, this affords an opportunity to do so.

Each ballot, whether sent by mail or left at the office, must be sealed, and if sent by mail must have the proper postage stamps affixed thereon (three cents if from out of town or on a rural route, two cents if from town), and should be addressed:

Presentations to Hockey Boys at Flesherton

Flesherton and vicinity to the number of over two hundred gathered Friday night in the Fraternal Hall, to do honor to the winners of the Centre Grey and Semi-Pro Hockey Leagues for the season of 1936-1937.

As Flesherton teams won both leagues, trophies were presented to both teams. Father Callaghan of Dundalk, president of the league, with an appropriate speech, presented the Centre Grey Cup to A. D. McIntyre, manager of the Centre Grey club, who received it on behalf of the team. John McVicar, president of the Semi-Pro League, presented the McDougall trophy to Delbert Smith, captain of the team and high scorer of the Semi-Pro League. H. A. McCauley, Reeve of Flesherton, addressed the assembly.

It had been planned to present the players with leather windbreakers, but it was impossible to obtain delivery in time. The presentation of these, however, will be made later. They are of horsehide, cream trimmed with tan, and bearing blue and white crests.

Both teams deserve great credit for their accomplishment. The Semi-Pro team, although they headed the league all season, only won out after a best three in five game series with Proton. This is the second year the locals have won the trophy. The cup was donated by the late J. McDougall, a Priceville old boy, for the promotion of hockey in the small centre. The team winning the league three years in succession will receive a duplicate of the trophy.

The Centre Grey Club won the league only after an uphill battle. With only two games to play they were practically out of the picture. But they eliminated Shelburne in two straight games and bested Chatsworth in a two out of three game series, to successfully wind up one of the most enthusiastic and successful hockey seasons Flesherton has ever known.

A dance was enjoyed by the large crowd, who enjoyed the music of the Grant St. John orchestra.

Grey Music Festival on May 25, 26 and 27

May 10th is the last day that prospective entrants to the 5th Annual Grey County Festival of Music may file applications with the secretary.

It is expected that competition in all classes, vocal, instrumental, choral and orchestral, will be exceptionally keen and competent adjudicators will select winners from each class. Season tickets, admitting the bearer to all sessions of competition, are now available.

Tree Planting Project for Markdale

At the last meeting of the Horticultural Society, Dr. L. G. Campbell, Messrs. F. D. Sawyer and W. J. Messenger were appointed to look after the Coronation Tree Planting Project. It is proposed to set out about 150 Maple Trees.

The trees will be placed along all streets if possible, the spacing to be determined by present plantings, etc. Those desiring trees are asked to pay 15 to 20 cents each. No other expense is entailed. The Maples any of the committee for the Maples.
