Flavoured Cream

Grading of print butter, which went into effect last fall, will not enable us to accept leek flavoured or off-grade cream. We, therefore, wish to announce that from now on this grade of cream cannot be accepted to be manufactured into butter.

The production of leek flavoured cream can be prevented by keeping the cows out of pastures where leeks grow. All cows do not eat leeks and leek flavoured milk from individual cows should be kept separate and not put through the separator.
