HOLLAND TOWNSHIP COUNCIL MINUTES

Holland, April 6th, 1937.
 Council met on above date for the transaction of Township business, all the members present, John Heighes, Esq., Reeve, presiding. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.
 The following were then read: Report of G. J. McNeely, valuing one sheep of Eddie Edmunds and one of Herbert Brown; communication from the Workmen's Compensation Board, re accident insurance; several relief accounts amounting to \$105.63.
 Gillespie - Dixon—That this Council pay for no drugs without the authority of the Relief Committee.—Carried.
 Gillespie - McFadden—That the Clerk notify the Sick Children's Hospital of Toronto that this Township is not responsible for Robert Graham.—Carried.
 Dixon - Hanna—That Gordon McKay and Fred Roche cut no more timber on the roads without permission of a member of the Council.—Carried.
 Dixon - Gillespie—That Wm. Barron be refunded \$2.00 dog tax owing to error in assessment.—Carried.
 Hanna - McFadden—That we appoint Sandy Cook member of the Board of Health for the balance of 1937.—Carried.
 Hanna - Dixon—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet No. 3 for the sum of \$234.20 be passed and the Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.
 Dixon - Gillespie—That we hold a special meeting on April 15th for the purpose of considering hiring a stone crusher for the Township of Holland.—Carried.
 Mr. Hanna presented Report No. 4 of Finance Committee, amounting to \$233.08.
 Gillespie - Dixon—That Report No. 4 of Finance Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.
 Council then adjourned until Tuesday, May 4th, at one o'clock p.m.

SPECIAL MEETING

Holland, April 15th, 1937.
