# The Markdale High School Places Thirdin Waterloo's Big Field and Track Meet

#### Helen Carefoot Establishes New Records and Wins Three of the Cups

Markdale High School Track and Field Team gained third place in the High School section in the first Meet of the current season at Waterloo on Saturday, May first. This Meet, one of the largest in the Province, had an entry list of 264 competitors representing 17 secondary schools. The Markdale team consisted of Helén and Mary Carefoot, Alice Cutting, Elda and Eileen Kinney, Isabel Boyd, Noble, Lloyd Wiley, David Hunt, Gordon Henderson and Sidney Borinsky.

Fifteen new records testify to a hotly contested list of events and perfect weather conditions. Helen contributed Markdale's Carefoot share in the record-breaking per formances by a baseball throw of 166 ft., 2 inches, and a shot put of 26 ft., 2 inches. In addition, she took the cup for first place in the standing broad jump with 7 ft., 21/2

Eileen Kinney won a silver cup in Markdale for first place in the 220 yard dash Elda Kinney was second in the fastest of the 6 heats in the 100 yard dash but did not win a place in the finals. In the 220 yd. finals Elda tripped and was unable to finish the

Alice Cutting won a ribbon for second prize in the high jump for jumping 4 ft., 1 inch, the same height as for the first prize winner. Alice succeeded in jumping 4 ft., 1 inch, in the fourth trial, thus winning second place. Mary Carefoot did splendid jumping in the the high jump, clearing 3 ft., 10 inches with

The Relay Team consisting of Elda Kinney, Isabel Boyd, Jane Noble and Eileen Kinney, at one time led in the first heat, but finished in third place, so were unable to enter the

Gordon Henderson placed fourth in the boys' 12 lb. shot put with a mark only three feet short of the winner's. He also qualified in his heat of the 100 yard dash in the fast time 10.2 seconds.

Sidney Borinsky failed to qualify in his heat of the 220 yard dash but forced his opponent to a new record in the quarter-mile event.

David Hunt returned to competition recovered from the injury which kept him on the sidelines last year and his broad jump was only two feet short of the winning effort.

Lloyd Wiley gave a creditable per formance in the Pole Vault, being tenth in the elimination in a large field of fifteen competitors from both collegiates and high schools.

### William Hampton Died Mrs. Wm. J. Jackson at Holland Centre

One of Holland Township's most respected residents died on Saturday afternoon at his home in Holland Centre in the person of Mr. William Edward Hampton, former Reeve, Councillor and Treasurer of the Township. He was in his S5th year.

Mr. Hampton had been ill for a number of years, death following a series of strokes from which he gradually grew weaker. A final stroke on Wednesday climaxed the long illness and he passed away on Saturday, May 1st, about 2 p.m.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hampton who had emigrated from Ireland, he had spent practically all his life in Holland Township. He had taken an active interest in the affairs of the Township, serving first as Councillor and later as Reeve. Still later he became the Treasurer of the Township, a position he held for many years

. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Mary Anne Chesney, and one adopted daughter, Mrs. George Stafford of Berkeley. Another adopted daughter, Mrs. Herman Schaefter of Hanover, predeceased him. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Robert Greenaway and Mrs. Eliza Carson both in the West.

Mr. Hampton was a member of Holland Centre L.O.L. No. 740, and the funeral was under their auspices. He was also an active member of St. Matthias' Church at Berkeley and served for many years as one of the Wardens.

The funeral on Tuesday to the Anglican Church cemetery at Berkeley was largely attended. Rev. C. O. Pherrill conducted a short service at the house and the burial service in the church at Berkeley. The Orange burial service was read at the grave by the officers of Holland Centre Lodge. The pallbearers were Messrs. Jas. Dixon, Ed. Beatty, Ed. Campbell, Jos. McMullen, E. T. Walters and J. S. Price.

### William John Watts **Buried on Monday**

The death occurred on Wednesday of last week of Mr. William John Watts, for many years past a farmer of the Berkeley district. The late Mr. Watts had not been enjoying the best of health for some time suffering from heart trouble, and his last illness came upon him only a week ago. Mrs. Jackson took a turn for the worse on Sunday morning and her demise followed as above indi-

The deceased had been in tender care of the faithful husband and daughter, but had not experienced much suffering owing to the nature of her affliction.

The deceased was born at Mark dale, Ontario, Canada, January 31, 1860, which made her 77 years of age at the time of her departure.
