Don't Send LEEK Flavoured Cream

Grading of print butter, which went into effect last fall, will not enable us to accept leek flavoured or off-grade cream. We, therefore, wish to announce that from now on this grade of cream cannot be accepted to be manufactured into butter.

The production of leek flavoured cream can be prevented by keeping the cows out of pastures where leeks grow. All cows do not eat leeks and leek flavoured milk from individual cows should be kept separate and not put through the separator.

Quality of Cream Reflects on Grade of Butter

Under new Government regulations covering the grading of butter, a higher standard of quality is required for First Grade.

Since High Quality Butter can only be made from High Quality Cream, we are asking your kind co-operation, so that we may be able to keep up the standard of our butter, which will also mean dollars and cents to the producer.

To assist you in producing High Quality Cream, we list below some of the common defects, together with the causes and methods of prevention.

SOUR OR ACID FLAVOUR—

Cream kept too long at too high a temperature; fresh cream being added to colder cream without first being cooled; can or pail being used to catch the cream from separator not being washed between each separating. Do not use old rusty pails or utensils, rusty separator bowls, galvanized pails, sap buckets or pails with open seams. Wash separator after each using. Cool cream until cold as soon as separated and keep cold until delivery to creamery. Never add warm cream to cold cream.

YEASTY CREAM—

Has a tendency to foam and smells yeasty. Usually associated with very high acid or sour cream and develops rapidly when held at high temperatures. Caused by unsanitary condition. Remedy: Same as for acid or sour flavour.

CHEESY CREAM—

Cause and remedy similar to yeasty cream.
